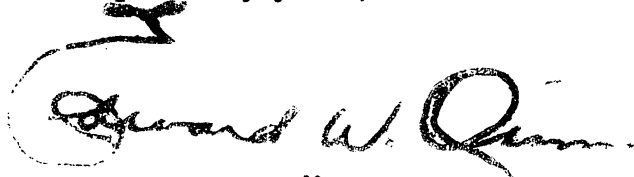
The Honorable, the City Council:

It is my sad duty to officially notify you of the death of Mr. John S. Clary who died Tuesday, June 19, after a short illness.

Mr. Clary was born in Cambridge and was a product of its schools. He started early in business life, and soon after became interested in the public affairs of our city. For three years, beginning 1887, he was a member of the Common Council, and the two years following a member of the Board of Aldermen. In the year 1903 he became a member of the Cemetery Commission.

In recognition of Mr. Clary's long and faithful public service I recommend that suitable action be taken as a tribute of respect to his memory, in which action I am ready to join.
