REPORT OF THE PERAMBULATION OF THE BOUNDARY LINE
BETWEEN THE CITY OF CAMBRIDGE AND THE
TOWN OF ARLINGTON

To the City Council of the City of Cambridge and the Selectmen of the
Town of Arlington

Gentlemen:

The undersigned committee, duly appointed by the City Council of the City of Cambridge, and the Selectmen of the Town of Arlington, to perambulate the boundary lines between said City and Town, would respectfully report that they did on Jan 11, 1971 examined the boundary line dividing said city and town and that they found monuments as described below, properly marked and standing in their proper positions.

Beginning at a stone bound marked "A. B. C." at the point where the boundary lines of the City of Cambridge and the Town of Arlington and the Town of Belmont intersect; thence, running south $50^{\circ} 53' 22''$ east a distance of two thousand six hundred fifty-two and seventy-three one hundredths (2,652.73) feet to an unmarked point at the junction of said line with the center line of the new channel of Alewife Brook, being the southerly boundary line between the City of Cambridge and the Town of Arlington, as located by Chapter 405 of the Acts of the Legislature for the year 1911, said unmarked point being One hundred twenty seven and fifty four one hundredths (127.54) feet northwesterly from the old witness monument marked "A.C." as measured along the before mentioned boundary line extended. From this unmarked junction the line follows the center of the new channel of Alewife Brook in a northeasterly direction a distance of about three thousand seven hundred and thirty four (3,734.0) feet to it's intersection with the division line between the cities of Cambridge and Somerville, said point
