### An Ordinance

In addition to an ordinance, for the removal of Nuisances, Sources of Filth, and causes of sickness, within the city of Cambridge.

Be it ordained, by the city council of the city of Cambridge, as follows:—1. No person shall drive, or cause to be driven, any cart or wagon containing night soil, or any wagon or cart used for that purpose, through any street, lane or alley in the city, between the hours of four O'clock A.M., and ~~eight~~ <sup>nine</sup> O'clock P.M.; nor permit any such wagon or cart, to stand between said hours, in any street, lane, or alley in said city. And any person, who shall offend against the provisions of this ordinance, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding twenty dollars, for each and every such offence.
