On Friday, May 11, the Massachusetts chapter of the National Lawyers Guild will honor Cambridge labor Attorney Ira Sills, a partner in the Boston firm of Segal, Roitman and Coleman, at its annual dinner at the Park Plaza Hotel in Boston.

Sills has been practicing labor law for 23 years and is a partner at the labor and employment firm of Segal, Roitman and Coleman. In addition to serving as executive director of the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists and Screen Actors Guild, he has served as counsel to numerous labor unions, representing his clients in organizing drives, negotiations, arbitrations and litigation. He has taught the fundamentals and fine points of labor law and collective bargaining to hundreds of Northeastern University Law School students, many of whom now serve as

union counsel throughout the country.

Boston orthopaedic surgeon James H. Herndon was named second vice president of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons at the organization's annual meeting in San Francisco, Calif. from Feb. 28 to March 4.

Dr. Herndon is Partners HealthCare professor of orthopaedic surgery at Harvard Medical School in Boston. He is chairman of the department of orthopaedic surgery at Massachusetts General and Brigham and Women's hospitals in Boston. Active in the academy, he has served as treasurer on the board of directors.

The editor of several orthopaedic books, author of chapters in 30 books, co-author of two books, and author or co-author of countless scientific papers and abstracts, he has made scientific presentations and lectures to hundreds of local, regional, national and international meetings.

The past president of the Academic Orthopaedic Society, the American Board of Orthopaedic Surgery, the American Orthopaedic Association and active committee member of the American Society for Surgery of the Hand, he has been involved with many local, regional and international associations.

He is a member of the Shands Circle of the Orthopaedic Research

and Education Foundation and has been a state chairman and co-chairman for many years. He is also a past president of the C. F. Reynolds Medical History Society and past chairman of the Residency Review Committee and the Joint Committee on Surgery of the Hand (1992-1994).

He is a member of the Peabody Society of Harvard University, the American College of Surgeons, American Society of Law and Medicine, American Medical Association, American College of Rheumatology, along with numerous other associations and societies. He is a member of the Harvard-Veterans Administration Dean's Committee and has been an active member of dozens of university and local/state committees.

An advocate for improved patient care, the academy is participating in the Bone and Joint Decade, the global initiative in the years 2000-2010 to raise awareness of musculoskeletal health, stimulate research and improve people's quality of life.

The justices of the Supreme Judicial Court recently announced the appointment of Jane Kenworthy Lewis of Cambridge as the assistant clerk of the Supreme Judicial Court for the commonwealth.

As assistant clerk, Lewis will assist the clerk with her responsibilities and the justices with their range of responsibilities regarding litigation in the commonwealth's courts. Her duties will include helping the clerk to develop and implement new procedures and policies to enhance the operations of the office, communi-

cating with counsel and unrepresented litigants to explain appellate procedures, coordinating with Trial Court clerks the preparation of papers in appeals to the SJC and the disposition of matters remanded by the SJC, participating in the management and refinement of the court's automated docketing system and other management systems, and assisting the clerk in the hiring, training and supervision of staff.

She has been the deputy reporter of decisions of the SJC since 1996, and was assistant reporter from 1987

until 1996. Prior to that, she was a lawyer in the firm of Berman and Moren for three years with a practice in civil and criminal law. She was a solo practitioner from 1982 to 1984. She began her legal career as a trial attorney with the Massachusetts Defenders Committee in Middlesex and Essex counties.

She is a graduate of Boston University Law School and Boston University, and has taken continuing education courses at Harvard Extension School where she is a candidate for certification in special

studies in administration and management. She is a member of the Association of Reporters of Judicial Decisions, and holds bar memberships in the Supreme Court of the United States, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the First Circuit, the U.S. District Court for the district of Massachusetts, and the commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Originally from Rockport, she lives in Cambridge with her husband, Francis H. Duehay, a former mayor and city councilor in Cambridge.
