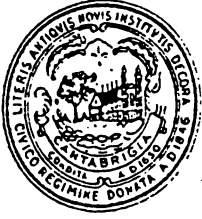

*Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:*

Chapter 8.56 entitled "Promotion of Non-Residential Solid Waste Reduction" is hereby amended by striking out Section 8.56.030 entitled "Advisory Committee on Environmentally Desirable Practices" and substituting in place thereof a new section 8.56.030 which reads as follows:

8.56.030

Advisory Committee on Environmentally Desirable Practices

1. There is hereby established in Cambridge an Advisory Committee on Environmentally Desirable Practices. The Committee will consist of eight members, of whom six will be appointed by the City Manager no later than two months after enactment of this Chapter. Of the six persons to be appointed,

three shall represent the community of for-profit and non-profit institutions in Cambridge; and

three shall be citizens who have demonstrated interest in municipal recycling and waste management.

Those three committee members representing the community shall be Cambridge residents and three committee members representing the institutional community shall either work or live in Cambridge.

In addition to the six appointed members, the Committee shall include

the Commissioner of Public Works or his designee; and

the Chairman or a member of the Cambridge Consumer Advisory Council.

2. The appointed members of the Committee shall serve for terms of two years, and an individual may serve for more than one term. The initial appointment of one member of the institutional community and one citizen recycler shall be for one year in order to stagger subsequent appointments. The City Manager may fill

vacancies on the Committee. Committee members shall serve without compensation.

3. The Committee shall hold regular meetings, shall inform the City Clerk of the time and place of such meetings, and shall publish notice of such meetings in a local newspaper at least one week prior to the meeting. A majority of the Committee shall constitute a quorum.

4. The City Manager shall provide the Committee sufficient administrative personnel and funding to carry out its responsibilities, which will be evaluated annually.

# Despite troubled economy, retailers take chances at new mall

Although the official opening is not until this morning, thousands of area residents got their first look at one new store — Fiene's — during a benefit preview shopping day on Tuesday. Besides shopping and prizes, there were guest appearances by celebrities, such as soap opera star Jean LeClerc of "All My Children."

Fiene's organizers said more than 50 social service and community organizations sold 10,000 \$5 tickets to the event, with each group keeping the proceeds.

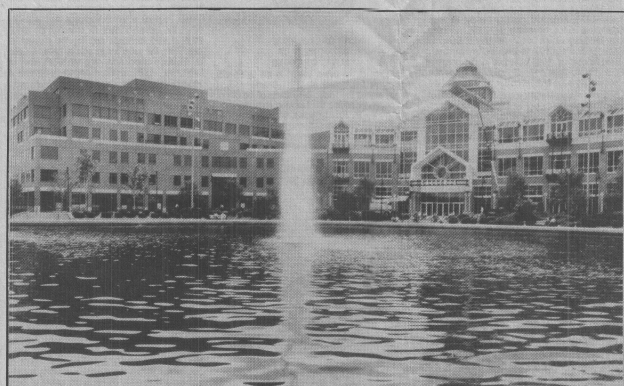
Tuesday was just the beginning of the festivities. Beginning today, shoppers will get a taste of Hollywood when Universal Studios comes to the mall. Among the events is a film screen test that gives visitors to the mall the chance to appear in a scene from "Back to the Future." Those who take the "test" will receive a free video of the result. Other highlights will be demonstrations of movie makeup, film stunts and special effects, and a floating movie screen on the Charles River showing popular Universal films.

But the real news from CambridgeSide goes beyond the opening events, to the risks retailers are taking by opening new stores at a time when the region's economy is hungry for new business activity.

Karp said the mall originally planned to open its doors in February 1991. But the schedule was advanced by five months, in part to catch the upcoming Christmas selling season. Despite the change, he said 80 to 85 percent of the space is already committed to retail tenants.

Some stores won't be ready for the grand opening this week, but Karp said he expects the mall to be 85 percent full by February. "And 50-60 percent is typical for opening a mall," he said.

**Clothing to kitchenware**  
As nearly 1,500 workers raced to complete the structure last week, the

mall's general manager Steve Sigel conducted a tour, pointing out some of the stores that are taking their chances in Cambridge.

They include a Limited, with space nearby reserved for Limited Too, a children's store. Two drug stores, including a CVS, are expected, and several book stores are also slated to open, including a B. Dalton on the lower level.

Kitchen Bazaar is expected to draw culinary celebrities as well as offer all the necessities and the luxuries, too, for the kitchen.

J. Crew will occupy space on two levels, and Sigel said it would be the largest J. Crew store in the area. Close by is Coda, a men's clothing store with a tough, high-tech look.

Next to that, for the more traditional minded, is Abercrombie & Fitch. Other stores include Thom McAn

shoes, Wilson's Suede and Leather and Victoria's Secret. Lane Bryant and Lerner's have rented space in the mall, and Sam Goody's will sell records.

**Food and service**  
Not all the shops will be tethered to a specific location. As at Faneuil Hall, pushcarts based in the spacious entrance hall will offer a variety of goods for sale.

Food will also be offered in abundance and in variety. Shoppers will be able to find everything from street food to an elegant dinner, and a food court in the entrance hall will offer a range of flavors from Italian to Japanese.

The Galleria is strong on services for shoppers, as well, Sigel said. An information kiosk in the lower level near the canal entrance offers a surprise: It's interactive. As a customer approaches, the face of a mall employee appears on a TV screen. Using video monitors,

customers can ask specific questions and get specific answers. The customer service center will also offer a coat and package check, year-round gift wrapping, facsimile and copy service. And the mall will boast a complete post office.

Free shuttle buses will drive a circuit between the Lechmere Square T station, the Kendall Square T station and the entrance to the mall every 15 minutes from 9 am to 10:30 pm, Monday through Saturday, and 11 am to 7 pm on Sunday.

For drivers, there are 2,600 parking spaces. ■ All grand opening events at the CambridgeSide Galleria are free. After today's ribbon cutting, the mall will be open until 9:30 pm. Friday and Saturday hours will be 10 am to 9:30 pm and Sunday, the mall will open 10 am to 6 pm. ■ The CambridgeSide Galleria is at 100 CambridgeSide Place, between First Street and Commercial Avenue in East Cambridge.

# 'Witches' conjures up fun for kids and adults

There's an unusual mix of talent in "The Witches," resulting in quite a fun movie. Along with "Darkman" and "After Dark, My Sweet," "The Witches" is making late-summer moviegoing lots of fun.

dish scheme to turn all the children in Britain into mice with her Formula 86. To demonstrate, she poisons an unsuspecting, gluttonous boy (Charlie Potter) she's lured to the auditorium with the promise of candy and turns him into a rodent.

When Luke's presence is discovered, he suffers the same fate, and for the second half of the movie Luke and the other boy are talking mice trying to get his grandmother's help in thwarting the Grand High Witch.

Meanwhile the hotel manager (the great Rowan Atkinson) is exerting his energy dealing with loose mice and soothing the anxieties of worried guests. Atkinson can do more with one raised eyebrow than most comic actors can do with their whole body, and his slow-burn reactions to the goings-on at the hotel are priceless.

Anjelica Huston is also at her best, and her icy malevolence makes this her best performance since "Prizzi's Honor." Bill Paterson, so memorable in Bill Forsyth's "Comfort and Joy" a few years ago, also chips in as the other boy's perturbed father.

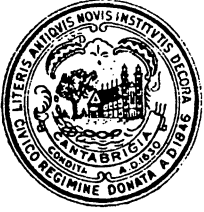

# City of Cambridge

The Ordinance Committee conducted a public hearing on Wednesday, July 25, 1990, beginning at 5:42 p.m. in the Sullivan Chambers, City Hall.

Councillor Francis H. Duehay, Chair of the above referenced Committee convened the hearing and stated that the Committee would consider and act on an amendment to Chapter 2.52, sections 2.52.010, 2.52.020 and 2.52.070 of the Municipal Code entitled "Police Department" as recommended by the City Manager. The Chair then outlined several procedural points that would be followed in the conduction of this date's proceedings. Participants in this hearing were: Mayor Alice K. Wolf, Vice Mayor Kenneth E. Reeves, Councillor Edward N. Cyr, Councillor Jonathan S. Myers, Councillor Sheila T. Russell, Councillor Walter J. Sullivan, Councillor Timothy J. Toomey, Jr., Councillor William H. Walsh, City Manager Robert W. Healy, and Deputy City Clerk John E. Flynn.

At this time City Manager Healy outlined to the Committee the proposed amendments to Chapter 2.52 of the Municipal Code. Specifically the proposed amendment's seek to clarify conflicts contained in the 1977 adopted amendments to this Chapter. The first amendment in Section 2.52.010 entitled Police Commissioner - Authority strikes the wording "and the appointing authority" and inserts the wording "and who shall from time to time make suitable regulations governing the Department and the Officers thereof, subject to the approval of the City Manager."

The second Amendment contained in Section 2.52.020 entitled Appointment - Removal - Compensation calls for the striking of the following sentences: "The person appointed to the position of Police Commissioner shall become a resident of the City within one year of the date of his appointment and that no quarters will be provided to the person appointed to this office. The City Manager shall assist the Police Commissioner to find living quarters within the City." The third set of amendments deal with Section 2.52.070 entitled Fees for Certain Permits and Other Documents in subsection A striking the word "two" and inserting the words "twenty-five" and in subsection B striking the word "two" and inserting the word "ten".

The City Manager further stated that by eliminating the residency requirement in an attempt to attract a larger pool of candidates he would request the successful appointment to live within a ten mile radius of the City of Cambridge.

Councillor Russell questioned the City Manager on the job description and the costs associated with the position of Police Commissioner and Chief of Police.

The City Manager in response stated that the Police Commissioner would command overall responsibility of the department. The Commissioner would deal in long range planning, community relations, budgetary control and implementation of departmental rules and regulations. The Chief of Police would serve in an operational basis with the uniform division and would serve as head of the department in the absence of the Commissioner.



A rough cost estimate would be in the neighborhood of \$140,000. for the position as well as an additional position in the Commissioner's Office. In the matter of the Salary for the Chief it is set by provisions of Ordinance 1059 dated August 6, 1987.

In questioning the residency recission, Councillor Walsh asked of the City Manager, given the complexity of the City how a non-resident and a non member of the department would be knowledgeable about the needs of the community. The City Manager in response stated that the new command staff consisting of a new Chief and three new captains all coming through the ranks with the two veteran Captains will provide the local resources that the Commissioner would need in the operation of the department. The City Manager further stated that the residency requirement serves to be restrictive in the recruitment process. Councillor Walsh further inquired if the City Manager was looking for a working Police Commissioner. The City Manager responded in the affirmative stating that he wanted a professional police manager.

Councillor Walsh citing his differing opinion regarding the residency requirement offered the following motions:

- 1) That in the event that the appointee is not a resident of Massachusetts that upon acceptance of employment that the person be compelled to live within the City of Cambridge for a period of two years; and



2) that the salary of the Commissioner including office staff shall not exceed \$150,000. per annum.

This second offering was amended by Councillor Toomey to include the following language "that the staff person be a current member of the Cambridge Police Department."

Mayor Wolf questioned the appropriateness of including the salary in the ordinance. City Manager Healy stated the belief that the salary cap might be a hindrance in the hiring process.

Councillor Cyr questioned if this kind of stipulation is contained in any other ordinance in the Municipal Code. The Manager responded in the negative. Councillor Cyr further stated that this stipulation was not good management and that it was contrary to the budget process.

Councillor Myers also voiced opposition to both the amendment and motion as offered citing that it could cause a hindrance in attracting quality applicants.

Mayor Wolf also voiced her opposition stating that the measure would not allow the appointee any flexibility in the organization of the office.

Councillor Cyr questioned if the stipulation was an infringement on the City Manager's duties in the hiring process.

In response the Manager stated that it was not necessary and would be counterproductive on the hiring process. The Manager further stated that it was his belief that a wise and seasoned police manager would probably select from within the department when organizing the Commissioner's Office.



On two roll call votes, both motions offered by Councillor Walsh failed 4-5-0-0.

Vice Mayor Reeves questioned the City Manager on the Chief of Police issue vis a vis the Commissioner. In response the Manager stated that it was his intent in the implementation of this plan to try to make it as painless as possible on the ranks of the department.

Vice Mayor Reeves then questioned the City Manager on the need of the position of Chief of Police. The Manager in response stated that the model being recommended at this time was in the best interest of meeting the public safety needs of the community and less likely to divide the department.

Vice Mayor Reeves then offered the following motion:

To exercise the last sentence in Section 2.52.010 and in Section 2.52.020 subsection A the following words "and the Chief of Police."

Councillor Myers voiced his opposition to the amendment citing the long standing tradition of the position and that the reconfiguration of the department should be determined by both the Commissioner and the Chief.



Duchay, Chair of the above referenced Committee convened the hearing and stated that the Committee would consider and act on an amendment to Chapter 2.52, sections 2.52.010, 2.52.020 and 2.52.070 of the Municipal Code entitled "Police Department" as recommended by the City Manager. The Chair then outlined several procedural points that would be followed in the conduction of this date's proceedings. Participants in this hearing were: Mayor Alice K. Wolf, Vice Mayor Kenneth E. Reeves, Councillor Edward N. Cyr, Councillor Jonathan S. Myers, Councillor Sheila T. Russell, Councillor Walter J. Sullivan, Councillor Timothy J. Toomey, Jr., Councillor William H. 
