COUNCILLOR WALTER SULLIVAN

- WHEREAS: This City Council, along with his countless close friends in this City, was deeply shocked upon learning of the tragic death on May 2, 1981 of Thaddeus R. Beal, a former resident of 108 Brattle Street and long-time, highly-respected business and civic leader in Cambridge prior to moving to New Hampshire a few years ago; and
- WHEREAS: Mr. Beal, a graduate of Hotchkiss School, Yale University and Harvard Law School, served as president of the Harvard Trust Company from 1959 to 1968 and as a partner in the Boston law firm of Herrick, Smith, Donald, Farley and Ketchum; and
- WHEREAS: Mr. Beal, a Navy Lieutenant Commander in World War II, interrupted his fourteen years of dedicated service as a charter member and former Chairman of the Cambridge Redevelopment Authority in his twelfth year, in 1969, to accept a Presidential appointment as Under Secretary of the Army; and
- WHEREAS: In addition to the Redevelopment Authority, Mr. Beal's involvement in Cambridge activities included service as a trustee of Mt. Auburn Hospital, a past president of the Cambridge Chamber of Commerce, Chairman of the Harvard Square Task Force, and as a Vestryman in Christ Church; now therefore be it
- RESOLVED: That this City Council go on record extending its deepest sympathy to Mr. Beal's family at this time of such tremendous personal loss; and be it further
- RESOLVED: That the City Clerk be and hereby is requested to forward a suitably engrossed copy of this resolution to Mr. Beal's wife, Katherine Putnam Beal, on behalf of the entire City Council and a community grateful for his distinguished contribution to the City of Cambridge and to his country.
