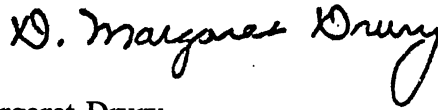

Reed Champion Pfeufer

Artist

Reed Champion Pfeufer, artist, illustrator and wife of James F. Pfeufer for 62 years, died in Hyannis Friday, Dec. 5, after a prolonged illness. She was 87.

Pfeufer, born in Newton, attended Newton Schools and the Moses Brown School in Providence. She later studied painting with Wallace Harrison in New York and, under scholar-

ship, at the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. Since 1972, she has been a permanent resident of Cape Cod.

During the 1930s, Pfeufer was an active painter among a group of artists later identified as the Boston School. She was selected for "30 Massachusetts Artists," an exhibit at the Institute of Contemporary Art, Boston. She has been exhibited at the Chicago Art Institute, Cincinnati Museum of Art, Horticulture Hall, with the Printmaker of Cape Cod, and the Cape Museum of Fine Arts.

She has also illustrated many books for Houghton Mifflin, the United Church Press and designed the poster for the first Newport Jazz Festival.

She is survived by her husband; daughter Martha Tanner of Foster RI; sons Joachim Pfeufer of Nantes, France and Eric Pfeufer of Cambridge; 15 grandchildren; 15 great-grandchildren; and brothers Henry S. Champion of Norwell and Roy Champion of Florida.

A memorial service was held Dec. 13 at the Friends Meeting House, South Yarmouth. Arrangements were made by Doane Beal and Ames in West Hartwich.

Louis Loss

Legal scholar

Louis Loss, the father of securities law, died Saturday at the Palliative Care Beth Israel/Deaconess long illness. He was 81.

Loss, of Cambridge, an authoritative text on securities law, has been cited 50 Supreme Court. He was the Securities and Exchange Commission in 1937 by President Roosevelt and has taught at Harvard Law School and instructed several current Court justices.

Loss published numerous books of wide renown, many of which have been translated into foreign languages. He has been a guest lecturer at law schools across the world and is remembered as one of the most legal scholars.

He is survived by his wife S. (Segaloff) of Cambridge; daughter Margaret R. Loss of Boston; and son Robert S. Loss of Boston. He also has three grandchildren.

Burial and cremation were private. The Harvard Law School will hold a public memorial service at a later date.
