February 13, 1978

- WHEREAS: To develop, define and preserve the history of Afro-American domestic life in the City of Cambridge through the use of the resources of cultural history, including, among other materials, the literature, history, philosophy, and fine arts created by, and enjoyed by Afro-Americans in Cambridge and brought by Afro-Americans to our city, and
- WHEREAS: To stimulate and encourage popular understanding of an appreciation for the history and character of Afro-American life in Cambridge through the production of visual displays, publications, and educational materials, and through the acquisition of facilities within which to preserve and present these materials, and
- WHEREAS: To further and promote stability of development and preservation of the historic and aesthetic character of the Harlem community through the preparation of reports, studies, and recommendations, and through participation in the creation of a community development plan and the designation of historic landmarks, and
- WHEREAS: The Jerome T. Lewis Memorial Room at the Central Square Branch Library will be the scene of a program entitled "The Black Religious Experience in America" at which a discussion by the Reverend Edward W. Rodman will focus on Faith, Community and Struggle in the Black Religious Experience in America, and
- WHEREAS: This City Council wishes to officially recognize Black History Month in the City of Cambridge, now therefore be it
- RESOLVED: That this City Council go on record proclaiming February 1978 as "Black History Month" and urge all our residents to attend the ceremonies at the Central Square Branch Library on Wednesday, March 8, 1978.
