# Board considers hiking turnpike tolls, selling more air rights

The possibility of higher tolls on the Massachusetts Turnpike and the sale of additional air rights was raised yesterday by turnpike board members who said the money is needed for repairs but also acknowledged the 135-mile highway will play a key role in developing the Central Artery/Third Harbor Tunnel project.

Turnpike tolls have been stable since 1979 when they went up 30 percent. Cars now pay 75 cents between Boston and Route 128

and \$3.60 from Weston to the New York state line at West Stockbridge.

The proposition of higher tolls and additional sales of air rights for development emerged at a swearing-in ceremony for Juan Evereteze, 37, of Cambridge, whom Gov. Dukakis installed as a member of the turnpike authority board.

Evereteze, president of Spectrum Airlines of New Bedford, a commuter carrier, was previously a member of the Massachusetts Port Authority and an assistant

secretary of transportation for land use planning in the Dukakis administration.

Allan McKinnon, chairman of the turnpike authority, said after the ceremony that a toll increase is under review as part of a study of the turnpike's future. He said the study is to be finished by Labor Day.

McKinnon said the turnpike will need more than the \$100 million it collects annually in tolls and rents just to keep up with maintenance programs.

The sale or lease of air rights

over the Seaport Access Road, which will link the turnpike with the new harbor tunnel in South Boston, also are being viewed as a revenue source, according to William V. Twomey, a project manager.

Twomey, in an interview earlier this summer, said as much as 30 acres of developable space may be available over the access road once it is built. Massport holds title to most of the land now, he said, and revenues probably would not be available until after the project is completed in 1994 or 1995.

In another matter, the turnpike authority plans to raise the round-trip toll for the Sumner and Callahan tunnels, which link downtown Boston with Logan Airport, from 60 cents to \$1 on Aug. 15, in part to finance a \$58 million repair project for the tunnels.

Discount coupons for East Boston residents went on sale yesterday at the tunnel offices on Havre Street in East Boston. They entitle holders to make the round trip for 40 cents, the same toll East Boston commuters have paid since 1969.
