The Petition

The petition would amend the accessory use section of the Zoning Ordinance (paragraphs (d) and (g) of Section 4.21) to make clear that home family day care is a permitted accessory use under the meaning of home occupation.

Recommendation

The Planning Board recommends adoption of a revised petition (enclosed) which would place the new language originally proposed for paragraph (d), Section 4.21 in the existing definition "Home Occupation" in Article 2.000. The change would simply put the same clarifying language originally proposed into a more logical central location within the Ordinance.

Findings

1. The care of children in the home is a traditional activity carried on in residential neighborhoods; that activity can reasonably be considered as within the meaning of "customary home occupation" as defined in the Cambridge Zoning Ordinance as a normal accessory use to a residential household.
2. The proposed amendment would eliminate any ambiguity as to the status of home family day care by, in the view of the Planning Board, making explicit that which is already implicit in the Zoning Ordinance. Additionally it would clearly define the limits of home family day care as an accessory use.

Public Hearing

The Planning Board held two public hearings on the proposed amendment. Ms. Isabella Hinds, of the Department of Human Services, described the extent of the need for home family day care in Cambridge and the licensing process by which the state regulates such activity. No one spoke in opposition to the adoption of the amendment.

Daily 9-hole and 18 hole rates are available at the golf course, plus season passes for residents, non-Cambridge residents, senior citizens and junior members.

**Surplus food distribution is planned**

Cambridge Economic Opportunity Committee, the anti-poverty agency for the City of Cambridge, will distribute free processed cheese, butter, dry milk, flour and rice to eligible Cambridge residents starting Monday, June 15 and running through Friday, June 19.

CEOC's distribution program currently provides government surplus foods to over 13,000 individuals per distribution. As in the past, a large volunteer force of Cambridge citizens will be distributing the products in public housing complexes and community centers throughout the city.

Recipients of Welfare, AFDC, Food Stamps, SSI, Fuel Assistance, WIC, Medicaid, Veteran's Aid or Head Start are automatically eligible. Those not on the above programs can

still receive food if their income meets federal guidelines: \$804 for a family of one, \$10,860 for a family of two and adding \$2820 for each additional family member.

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# Panel offers new plan for Simplex

District, including the call for 600 housing units with 25 percent allocated for low- to moderate income residents. But more specifically, the committee supported most of Forest City's plans for the University Park project.

The committee is comprised of CDD and other city officials, local architects and planners, the director of the Riverside/Cambridgeport Community Corp., a Forest City representative and a Massachusetts Institute of Technology official. (MIT leases the 27-acre Simplex site to Boston-based Forest City.)

"The stimulus of much of the (revitalization) process is University Park," observed Peter Chermayeff, co-chair of the committee. With the exception of Forest City's initial plan for housing, "our overall recommendation is that the density that was proposed (by the developer) would not be changed."

Forest City's current proposal,

which was shaped over a two-year period, calls for 890,000 square feet of office space; one million square feet of research, development and light industrial space; 100,000 square feet of retail space; a 350-room hotel; and 110 units of housing. The total development would be 2.37 million square feet, covering an area bounded by Pacific, Brookline and Purrington streets, with a gateway on Mass. avenue at the intersection of Sidney street.

An alternative proposal now being considered in Forest City's final environmental impact report (EIR) indicates that the total development would be revised down to 1.87 million square feet.

The final EIR is expected to be submitted next month to the state office of environmental affairs, which must approve it before building permits can be issued.

Chermayeff explained that the primary objectives of the committee were to create more open spaces as

well as landscaping throughout the University Park complex; direct the flow of traffic away from the surrounding residential areas; integrate the proposed low-rise housing along Brookline street with additional high-rise housing near Sidney street; and orient both residential and commercial activity toward the large common area running down the middle portion of the complex.

In fact, Forest City Project Manager Drew Lef said that the firm is seriously evaluating how the four-story Fenton Shoe Building, located on Franklin street, can be used for both retail and housing.

"We are looking at (a minimum) of 200 units and probably close to 300 units," Lef said. "Our plan is to do at least 25 percent low- and moderate income housing," he said, adding that "we are doing everything we can to make the blue ribbon committee decision happen."

Pablo Calderon, director of the non-profit Riverside/Cambridgeport Community Corp., said, "We are in negotiations with Forest City," to help develop more affordable housing in University Park. "And we are looking at alternative funding" for the 150 affordable housing units recommended for the Cambridgeport Industrial District, Calderon said.

The issue of housing in the University Park development has been a vital concern of the Simplex Steering Committee, which for more than a decade has fought MIT over the density of proposed developments in its backyard. In fact, the Cambridgeport neighborhood group refused to partake in the blue ribbon committee process because of Forest City and MIT representation.

"The recommendation itself is shy of what we had hoped for," said Simplex Steering Committee member William Cavellini. "Our neighborhood plan calls for 450 units of housing with 30 percent affordable."

Unhappy with this news, Cavellini also said, "The other disappointment is that the overall plan for Simplex has not been challenged by this report."

The Simplex Steering Committee, in a slew of public hearings, has repeatedly voiced concern about the density of the University Park development, the prospects for more open space, the issues of traffic and parking, the construction impact on the surrounding neighborhood, and the lack of blue-collar jobs at the complex.

Another committee member, William Noble, described the blue

ribbon committee's report as vague. "I definitely think it's a one-dimensional report."

In anticipation of the report's release this week, the Simplex Steering Committee scheduled a rally for Saturday, Dec. 20, at 2 p.m., at Brookline and Franklin streets.

In the months ahead, CDD's Rosenberg pointed out that there are still a number of critical steps that need to be taken before the blue ribbon committee's recommendations for both the Cambridgeport Industrial District and the University Park project can be implemented.

If the city council adopts the committee's recommendations, CDD would have to create zoning districts on the entire site to accommodate them. The rezoning package would then require the approval of the planning board and city council, a process that could last six months, Rosenberg said.

City Councilor Sandra Graham, a Cambridgeport resident, commented, "A lot of people would think (the report) is flawed...but it was a good attempt at trying to find some consensus that we can make move forward."

But Graham added: "The issue now is how to we get the votes to zone."

4,000 units range from \$60 to \$1,100. Because of the 20 percent cap, the majority of apartments that currently rent for less than \$200 will not receive the maximum monthly increase of \$46 per unit, according to Laurie Goetz, assistant director of management and systems at the rent control office. On the other hand, the majority of apartments currently renting for more than \$230 will receive the maximum monthly increase of \$46 per unit, Goetz said.

The method for adjusting Class D rents takes into consideration such operating expenses as insurance, maintenance and repairs. These costs are subtracted from a landlord's gross rental income, which forms the basis for a "fair" rent increase in terms of inflation.

Trying to devise a method that would establish fair net operating incomes for Class D landlords is extremely problematical, Druy said, especially for those with lower rent apartments.

"It is not only the issue of Class D properties...the board is trying to address the problems of units with unfair rent levels," she said. Both tenant representatives of the rent control board were strongly against adopting the current method for raising the rents of Class D properties.

"The data base at the rent control board is in terrible shape," charged Tim Connor, a tenant representative. "This (the general adjustment) has not helped the lower rental properties and has given an undeserved windfall to larger rental properties."

Connor claimed, for example, that Class D and Class C properties are different, with the exception that their respective landlords have never applied for individual rent adjustments. "There are 767 Class C buildings in the city that include roughly 2,950 units, according to the rent control office. They received a similar adjustment last year based on rental figures for 1987."

"The board made an a priori assumption that they were comparable, but they aren't," Connor said.

But the rent control board's chair and two landlord representatives differ with the tenant advocates over the issue of fairness.

"There is no perfect method for adjusting Class D properties," conceded Ellen Semonoff, chair of the rent control board. However, the adopted method "allows us to make a comparable adjustment for these properties."

Sally Ackerman-Eaton, a landlord representative, added: "It seems to me the most logical and fair one since the (rent control system) is based on using rental figures for 1987. (The rent control board established 1967 as the base year because it precedes the escalating rents caused by debates on rent control in the late 1960s and the inflation of the early 1970s.)"

a substitute motion stipulating that "a portion of the Cambridge Common be permanently allocated as a public forum for displays relating to the beliefs and traditions of any person or organization, including religious observance of any kind which shall include Christmas displays."

But before the motion faced a final vote, Daney sharply attacked Wolf for initially complaining to Healy about the Nativity scene.

"We have become a nit-picking society," said Daney, who had remained silent for most of the evening. "And I think it took a nit-picker

to bring this up."

"I take umbrage" at being called a "nit-picker," Wolf rejoined. "And Daney shot back, 'Well, you're not, that's the only reason you're doing it, so you can get your goddamn name in the paper.'"

Visibly shaken by Daney's outburst, Wolf later apologized to the city council for furor that she may have caused.

Ultimately, the city council passed David Sullivan's substitute motion by a 5-4 margin. Daney, Walter Sullivan, Russell and Walsh voted against it.

However, it was unclear whether the city would move the Nativity scene from the Dante Center to the Cambridge Common before Christmas. Both Daney and Walsh offered pay \$50 each to have the creche moved from the center and erected on the common, so that the city would not be held responsible for endorsing a specific religious symbol.

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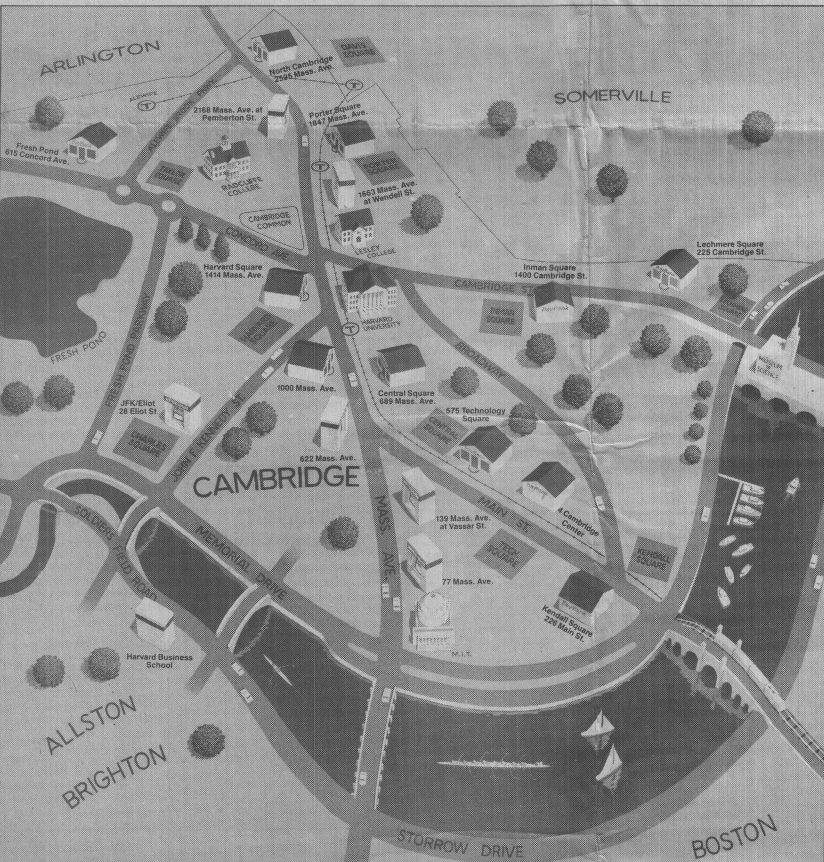

# Panel offers new plan for Simplex

District, including the call for 600 housing units with 25 percent allocated for low to moderate income residents. But more specifically, the committee supported most of Forest City's plans for the University Park project.

The committee is comprised of CDD and other city officials, local architects and planners, the director of the Riverside/Cambridgeport Community Corp., a Forest City representative and a Massachusetts Institute of Technology official. (MIT leases the 27-acre Simplex site to Boston-based Forest City.)

"The stimulus of much of the (revitalization) process is University Park," observed Peter Chermayeff, co-chair of the committee. With the exception of Forest City's initial plan for housing, "our overall recommendation is that the density that was proposed (by the developer) would not be changed."

Forest City's current proposal,

which was shaped over a two-year period, calls for 890,000 square feet of office space; one million square feet of research, development and light industrial space; 100,000 square feet of retail space; a 350-room hotel; and 110 units of housing. The total development would be 2.37 million square feet, covering an area bounded by Pacific, Brookline and Purvington streets, with a gateway on Mass. Avenue at the intersection of Sidney Street.

An alternative proposal now being considered in Forest City's final environmental impact report (EIR) indicates that the total development might be revised down to 1.87 million square feet.

The final EIR is expected to be submitted next month to the state office of environmental affairs, which must approve it before building permits can be issued.

Chermayeff explained that the primary objectives of the committee were to create more open spaces as

well as landscaping throughout the University Park complex; direct the flow of traffic away from the surrounding residential areas; integrate the proposed low-rise housing along Brookline Street with additional high-rise housing near Sidney Street; and orient both residential and commercial activity toward the large common area running down the middle portion of the complex.

In fact, Forest City Project Manager Drew Lefl said that the firm is seriously evaluating how the four-story Fenton Shoe Building, located on Franklin Street, can be used for both retail and housing.

"We are looking at (a minimum) of 200 units and probably close to 300 units," Lefl said. "Our plan is to do at least 25 percent low and moderate-income housing," he said, adding that "we are doing everything we can to make the blue ribbon committee decision happen."

Pablo Calderon, director of the non-profit Riverside/Cambridgeport Community Corp., said, "We are in negotiations with Forest City," to help develop more affordable housing in University Park. "And we're looking at alternative funding" for the 150 affordable housing units recommended for the Cambridgeport Industrial District, Calderon said.

The issue of housing in the University Park development has been a vital concern of the Simplex Steering Committee, which for more than a decade has fought MIT over the density of proposed developments in its backyard. In fact, the Cambridgeport neighborhood group refused to partake in the blue ribbon committee process because of Forest City and MIT representation.

"The recommendation itself is shy of what we had hoped for," said Simplex Steering Committee member William Cavellini. "Our neighborhood plan calls for 450 units of housing with 30 percent affordable."

Unhappy with this news, Cavellini also said, "The other disappointment is that the overall plan for Simplex has not been challenged by this report."

The Simplex Steering Committee, in a slew of public hearings, has repeatedly voiced concern about the density of the University Park development, the prospects for more open space, the issues of traffic and parking, the construction impact on the surrounding neighborhood, and the lack of blue-collar jobs at the complex.

Another committee member, William Noble, described the blue

ribbon committee's report as vague. "I definitely think it's a one-dimensional report."

In anticipation of the report's release this week, the Simplex Steering Committee scheduled a rally for Saturday, Dec. 20, at 2 p.m. at Brookline and Franklin streets.

In the months ahead, CDD's Rosenberg pointed out that there are still a number of critical steps that need to be taken before the blue ribbon committee's recommendations for both the Cambridgeport Industrial District and the University Park project can be implemented.

If the city council adopts the committee's recommendations, CDD would have to create zoning districts on the entire site to accommodate the rezoning package would then require the approval of the planning board and city council, a process that could last six months, Rosenberg said.

City Councilor Sandra Graham, a Cambridgeport resident, commented, "A lot of people would think it (the report) is flawed...but it was a good attempt at trying to find some consensus that we can make move forward."

But Graham added: "The issue now is how to we get the votes to zone."

4,000 units range from \$60 to \$1,100. One of the 20 percent cap, the majority of apartments that currently rent for less than \$230 will not receive the maximum monthly increase of \$46 per unit, according to Laurie Goetz, assistant director of management systems at the rent control office. On the other hand, the majority of apartments currently renting for more than \$230 will receive the maximum monthly increase of \$46 per unit, Goetz said.

The method for adjusting Class D rents takes into consideration such operating expenses as insurance, maintenance and repairs. These costs are subtracted from a landlord's gross rental income, which forms the basis for a "fair" rent increase in terms of inflation.

Trying to devise a method that would establish fair net operating incomes for Class D landlords is expected to be the next step at the rent control office, especially for those with lower rent apartments.

"It is not only the issue of Class D properties...the board is trying to address the problems of units with unfairly low rents," she said.

Both tenant representatives of the rent control board were strongly against adopting the current method for raising the rents of Class D properties.

"The data base at the rent control board is in terrible shape," charged Tim Connor, a tenant representative. "This (the general adjustment) has not helped the lower rental properties and has given an undesired windfall to larger rental properties."

Connor claimed, for example, that Class D and Class C properties are different, with the exception that the respective landlords have never applied for individual rent adjustments. (There are 767 Class C buildings in the city that include roughly 2,950 units, according to the rent control office. They received a similar adjustment last year based on rental figures for 1967.)

"The board made an a priori assumption that they were comparable, but they aren't," Connor said.

But the rent control board's chair and two landlord representatives differ with the tenant advocates over the issue of fairness.

"There is no perfect method for adjusting Class D properties," conceded Ellen Semonoff, chair of the rent control board. However, the adopted method "allows us to make a comparable adjustment for these properties."

Sally Ackerman-Eaton, a landlord representative added: "It seems to me the most logical and fair one since the (entire) system" is based on using rental figures for 1967. (The rent control board established 1967 as the base year because it precedes the escalating rents caused by debates on rent control in the late 1960s and the inflation of the early 1970s.)

to bring this up."

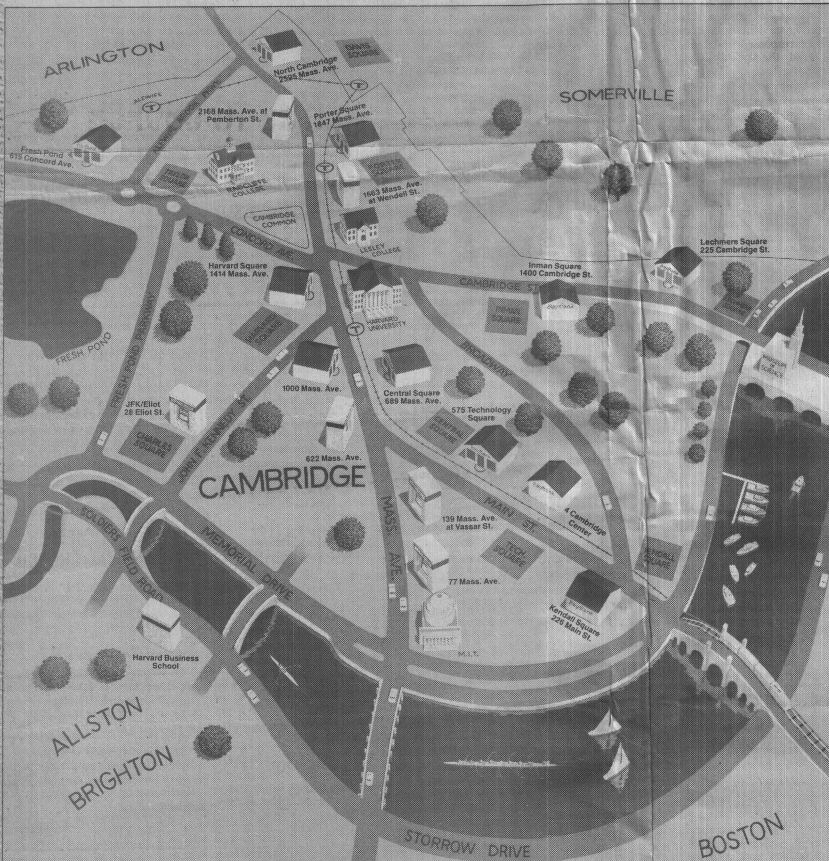
"I take umbrage" at being called a "nit-picker," Wolf rejoined.

AN ORDINANCE

In amendment to an ordinance formerly entitled: "The General Ordinances of the City of Cambridge" as revised in 1984, Chapter 122B, Section 22B.01, to read:

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:  
Chapter Thirteen entitled: "Offenses," Article II entitled: "Offenses Against Public Health" is hereby amended by adding to the end thereof a new Article II entitled: "Offenses Against Public Health," Section 13-4.1 entitled: "Smoking Prohibited" which reads as follows:

**ARTICLE II. OFFENSES AGAINST PUBLIC HEALTH**

**Section 13-4.1. Smoking Prohibited.**

"No person shall smoke in any public place which is a public nuisance, dangerous and hazardous to the public health, and violative of the rights of non-smokers to breathe air which is free of smoke contamination.

"As used herein, "Smoking" shall include carrying a lighted cigarette, cigar, pipe or other tobacco product.

"(a) No person shall smoke in any vehicle accessible to the public in which the public is permitted, including but not limited to, any health care facility, classroom, lecture hall, theater, motion picture theater, opera house, concert hall, library, auditorium, school, retail store, reception area, restaurant or tavern, seating room, bar, bar lounge or bar, but not including any private residence, nor any restaurant or other place mentioned in subsection (e) nor any party, beaning game, social reception, or fraternal or veterans' organizations.

"This subsection shall apply to any restaurant with a seating capacity of fewer than twenty-five (25) persons. Nor shall this subsection apply to any area with a seating capacity of fewer than twenty-five (25) persons, which is used primarily for selling alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises and in which any sale of food or presentation of entertainment is incidental to the sale of such beverages.

"No person shall smoke in any restaurant except in specifically designated smoking areas. This prohibition does not apply to any restaurant which is used for a private social function and not by the proprietor or person in charge of the restaurant.

"Smoking areas may be designated by the proprietor or other person in charge of a restaurant, except in places in which the sale of food or other services is the primary purpose of the restaurant. Smoking areas designated so shall comprise no more than seventy-five (75) percent of the seating capacity of the restaurant. Where smoking areas are designated, existing physical barriers and ventilation systems shall be used to minimize the adverse effect of smoke on persons in adjacent non-smoking areas. In the case of restaurants consisting of a single room, the provisions of this subsection shall be considered met if one side of the room is reserved and posted as a non-smoking area, provided that the non-smoking area comprises no less than twenty-five (25) percent of the seating capacity of the restaurant.

"However, to the extent that the shape of the room allows maximum separation, the proprietor will be required to utilize those natural barriers to satisfy the provisions of this section. Furthermore, if such natural barriers do not exist, the proprietor will make every effort to set up the space to isolate the transfer of smoke and to minimize the adverse effect of smoke on persons in adjacent non-smoking areas.

"The proprietor or other person in charge of a restaurant shall make reasonable efforts to prevent smoking in the non-smoking areas of the restaurant by:

(1) posting appropriate signs;

(2) arranging seating to provide a smoke free area;

(3) asking smokers to refrain from smoking upon request of a client, patron or employee suffering discomfort from the smoke;

(4) any other means which may be appropriate.

"In addition to the remedies provided by subsections (1) and (4), the Inspectional Services Department or any person approved by the willfully violate of the proprietor or other person in charge of a restaurant to comply with any provision of this subsection may apply for injunctive relief to enforce the provisions of this subsection in any court of competent jurisdiction.

"Nothing in this subsection shall make lawful smoking in any area in which smoking is or may hereafter be prohibited by law.

"(1) Except as provided in paragraph (2), no person shall smoke in any room under the control of a public or private employer which employees normally frequent during the course of employment, including, but not limited to, work areas, employee lounges and restrooms, conference rooms, and hallways, but not including any private residence unless it is used as a child care or health care facility, or any dining area of a restaurant, except as provided in subsection (a).

"(2) (A) At the written request of one or more employees, an employer may (but is not required to) designate the area in the immediate vicinity of the employee's usual work station as a smoking area, if the employer finds that a smoking area will not allow non-smoking employees or the public to breathe any significant amount of smoke. Upon such request and finding, an employer may also make other reasonable accommodation to smoking employees, including provision of a separate employee lounge or designated smoking area, or other designated smoking areas, or other lounge for non-smokers. Upon request in writing, an employer shall provide a copy in writing of its smoking policy under this paragraph, including any designated smoking areas or other accommodation for smoking employees, to any employee, prospective employee, and the Commissioner of Health and Hospitals. Any employee aggrieved by an employer's smoking policy or any person thereof may appeal in writing to the Commissioner, who may modify it in any manner to carry out the purposes of this section. In any dispute arising from a smoking policy, the health concerns of non-smokers shall be given precedence.

"(3) The Commissioner of Health and Hospitals shall enforce this subsection and subsection (d), and for this purpose shall have the assistance of the City Manager and the Police, Law and Inspectional Services Departments. In addition to the remedies provided by subsections (1) and (2), the Commissioner or any person aggrieved by any violation of this subsection or subsection (d) may apply for injunctive relief to enforce this subsection in any court of competent jurisdiction. This does not apply to small businesses which occupy only 1500 square feet of office space and where 100% of the employees have no objection.

"(4) Every person having control of premises upon which smoking is prohibited by this ordinance, or his or her agent or designee, shall conspicuously display upon the premises a sign reading "Smoking Prohibited by Law."

"(5) It shall be unlawful for any person having control of any premises or place in which smoking is prohibited by this ordinance to knowingly permit a violation of this ordinance. A person shall be held to have knowingly permitted a violation of this ordinance if a visitor to his or her premises observes another person smoking in a designated smoking area on three successive occasions. Any licenses issued by this city to such person shall be subject to suspension for up to fifteen (15) days for a single violation of this ordinance, and shall be subject to suspension for up to one year, or to revocation, for any successive violation.

"(6) Any person who knowingly violates any provision of the ordinance, or who smokes in an area in which smoking is prohibited by this ordinance, shall be liable for a civil penalty of not more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars.

"If any person, upon conviction, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance.

"This ordinance shall take effect ninety days after its final passage.



# City of Cambridge

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In City Council January 12, 1987

**The** Ordinance **Committee** comprised of the entire membership of the City Council, conducted a public hearing on Thursday, January 8, 1987 beginning at 6:23 p.m. in the Sullivan Chamber for the purpose of reviewing the petition of Honey Schnapp relative to amending the Zoning Ordinances of the City of Cambridge as it relates to Section 4.21.

The Ordinance Committee heard from Neil Michaels of 20 Clay St., Cambridge, who informed the Committee that he was representing the petitioner, who was unable to attend and as an employee for the Cambridge Council for Children. He further stated the reason for the petition was as an effort to achieve consistency with the reality of family day care within the Cambridge community. He urged the Council to support the petition.

At this time, Councillor Wolf stated that although she supported the concept of the proposal, she was extremely concerned relative to the safety precautions taken within the homes where these children would be cared. She further questioned whether or not adequate public safety procedures were evident in the certification process.

Jill Herold, Assistant City Manager for Human Services responded by stating that although the current certification process does not specifically address the fire safety issue, these kind of inspections are, in fact, done, and that possibly consideration could be given to mandating said inspections within local zoning law. She further stated that as the Chair of the Governor's Advisory Council on the Study of Day Care, the Council has been reviewing such issues as zoning and safety relative to state-wide family day care.

Councillor Duehay questioned the specific changes presented in the petition before the Committee this evening.

Mr. Les Barber of the Community Development Department outlined the changes which appear in paragraphs (d) and (g) of Section 4.21 of the Zoning Code. Mr. Barber concurred with Ms. Herold that it is possible that a comprehensive safety inspection program could be mandated through the zoning law.

Councillor Wolf also raised the question relative to tenants receiving permission from landlords prior to operating a family home day care center.

Councillor Duehay moved to refer the petition to the City Council without recommendation.

Mayor Walter Sullivan requested to be recorded in the negative.

The hearing was adjourned at 7:05 p.m.

## AN ORDINANCE

In amendment to an ordinance formerly entitled "The General Ordinances of the City of Cambridge" as revised in 1972 and now designated as "The Code of the City of Cambridge".

*Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:*

### SECTION 1.

Chapter Thirteen, entitled "Offenses" is hereby amended by striking out the present section 13-2, entitled "Injuring, destroying or trespassing on public property" (as added by Ordinance 1017) and inserting in place thereof the following new section 13-2:

#### Sec. 13-2. Injuring or destroying public or private property

No person shall, without proper authority, paint on, write on, or otherwise injure, deface, destroy or vandalize any public building or any public or private property.

Any person who violates this section shall be subject to a fine of three hundred dollars (\$300).

### SECTION 2.

Said Chapter Thirteen is further amended by striking out the present section 13-3, entitled "Street lamps" and inserting in place thereof the following new section 13-3:

#### Sec. 13-3. Trespassing on public property

No person shall trespass on the roof of a public building or within a school building after regular school hours without the prior permission of a duly authorized public official.

At least two signs shall be posted on all public buildings with not less than one inch letters, not more than 10 feet, and not less than 6 feet from the ground, black letters on white background as follows:

**City of Cambridge**  
No Trespassing and  
No Defacing of this public building.  
Violators will be prosecuted to the  
full extent of the law.

City Manager

Any person who violates any provision of this section shall be subject to a fine of not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the first offense, not more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the second offense and not more than three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for subsequent offenses.

SECTION 3.

Said Chapter Thirteen is further amended by adding the following new section 13-21:

Sec. 13-21. Sale of Certain Paints and Markers

No person shall, within the City, sell, display, expose or keep for sale any aerosol spray paint can, or any marker containing a fluid which is not watersoluble and which has a point, brush, applicator or other writing surface in excess of one-half inch, unless at the point of display or sale there is posted a sign with letters not less than one and one-half inches in height bearing the following words:

"SALE OF SPRAY PAINT AND BROAD INDELIBLE MARKERS TO PERSONS UNDER EIGHTEEN AND THE UNLAWFUL PURCHASE OR POSSESSION OF PAINTS AND SUCH MARKERS BY PERSONS UNDER EIGHTEEN IS PUNISHABLE BY A THREE HUNDRED DOLLAR FINE."

nor shall any person sell or deliver any aerosol spray paint, or any marker containing a fluid which is not watersoluble and which has a a point, brush, applicator or other writing surface in excess of one-half inch to any person under eighteen years of age or to any person of whatever age who refuses to submit for inspection if requested a driver's license, liquor purchase identification or other identification to establish the age of such person, nor shall any person being under the age of eighteen purchase, conceal, or remove from the premises such items, providing that nothing herein shall prevent the parent, guardian, employer, or teach of such a minor person from delivering such items to a minor intending the same to be lawfully used.

Any person who violates this section shall be subject to a fine of three hundred dollars (\$300.00).

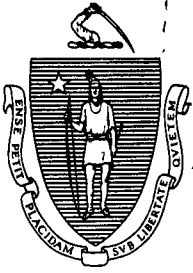

On behalf of the Cambridge Council for Children, I would like to ask your consideration of the proposed revisions to the city's zoning ordinance. These revisions are intended to achieve consistency with the reality of family day care in our community. There are over 200 licensed family day care homes in Cambridge, providing a very necessary service. Family day care is a unique resource and one which in our experience, is appropriately viewed as an extension of the family environment. Family day care is, therefore, completely compatible with the character of residential neighborhoods.

We are requesting that the Zoning Ordinance be amended in two respects: first, family day care should be specifically identified as a "customary home occupation"; and secondly, family day care should be permitted to use the entire premises of the residence.

In recent months, a sub-committee of the Statewide Advisory Council to the Office for Children has been engaged in a comprehensive review of the issues facing family day care statewide. Throughout this process, recommendations are being developed to facilitate the growth of the family day care while ensuring quality care and respect for local concerns.

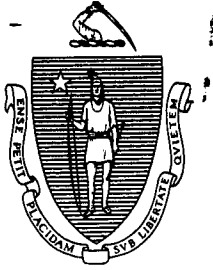
