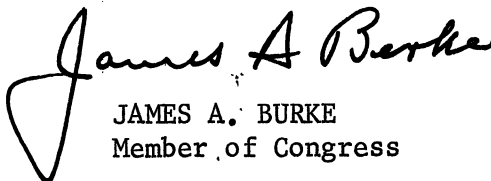
This will acknowledge and thank you for taking the time to forward me a copy of the recent resolution adopted by the Cambridge City Council.

This is to advise that I am upset with the present disarray in the treatment accorded immigrants in the United States. It seems that false hopes are being encouraged, individuals are being victimized in some areas, and some measures must be taken to amend this intolerable situation.

As you are probably aware, under the recently amended Rules of the House Judiciary Committee, private immigration relief measures are not effective unless documented evidence of extreme hardship is present, a rule which will eliminate those cases which do not meet the hardship requirement.
