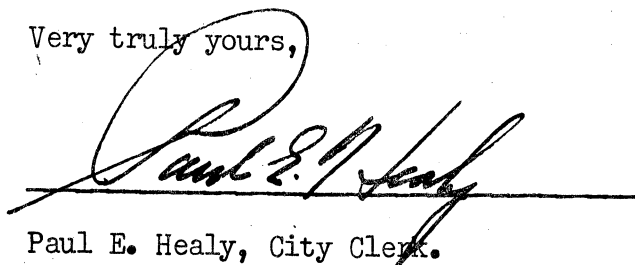

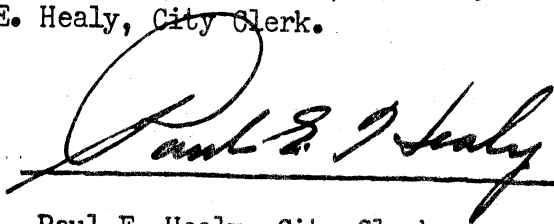
- WHEREAS: Every precinct in Cambridge voted overwhelmingly for a nuclear weapons freeze at the City election on November 3; and
- WHEREAS: President Reagan and Secretary Haig promised to resume negotiations with the Soviet Union on the issue of strategic arms reductions; and
- WHEREAS: A two-day meeting was scheduled in Geneva, Switzerland for tomorrow, January 26 between Secretary Haig and Foreign Minister Gromyko, and one of the promised subjects was the resumption of strategic arms control negotiations; and
- WHEREAS: The State Department has announced that Secretary Haig is willing to meet for only one day instead of two days and that the subject of Poland probably will consume the entire meeting; and
- WHEREAS: This change of plans reportedly is the result of the influence of former Secretary of State Kissinger, who is not an official of the United States government and whose "linkage" and other policies were discredited along with the Nixon administration; and
- WHEREAS: Pressure on the Soviet Union on the subject of Poland are necessary and desirable, but it is some 200-400 million citizens of the United States and Russia who are at this moment targeted to die one-half hour from after certain buttons are pushed in Moscow and Washington; now therefore be it
- RESOLVED: That the Cambridge City Council directs its Assistant to telegraph the President the message,
- "Every precinct of this heterogeneous city and every precinct of Boston voted in the municipal elections last November 3 in favor of a nuclear weapons freeze. Conducting strategic arms reductions negotiations with the Soviet Union is your most important duty to humanity."

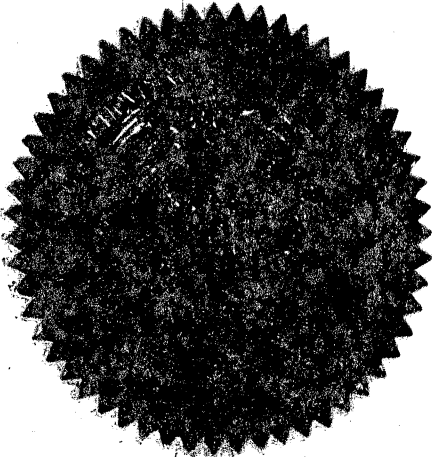
and to mail copies of this resolution to the President, Secretary Haig, Congressman O'Neill, and Senators Kennedy and Tsongas.
