WHEREAS: This overt act demonstrated a total disregard and a mockery of religious principles held by many Cantabrigians; and

WHEREAS: This City is noted for its appreciation of diverse cultures and religions; and

WHEREAS: The Cambridge City Council has always stood in the forefront of defending people's rights to their belief; now therefore be it

RESOLVED: The Cambridge City Council, through its City Clerk, notify the manager of HMV Records in Harvard Square and the president of HMV in New York that the Council condemns this display of lack of sensitivity towards Christian beliefs and urge the president of HMV Records to discontinue such promotional activities as the one contained in the attached Globe article.

It is likely that two billion people in China have no idea who **Madonna** is. It is even more likely that if Time Warner has its corporate way, that number will be down in the low five figures by the end of this week.

Locally, consumers are bracing themselves for a double-barreled Madonna barrage, beginning with her "Erotica" CD, which went on sale this morning, and climaxing (as it were) with "Sex," the Material Girl's much-publicized \$50 coffee-table book, which hits stores nationally tomorrow. Demand for both products has been building steadily as pre-release hype reaches flood-stage proportions.

Last night, HMV records in Harvard Square sponsored a Madonna "most erotically dressed" contest and an all-Madonna karaoke competition, plus a performance by the Dancing In Time dancers from the AIDS Action Committee. Tomorrow night between 6 and 8, the store will place one copy of "Sex" on

a makeshift altar. For a \$3 donation to the American Foundation for AIDS Research, anyone over 18 can thumb through the book. "People dressed up as nuns and priests will collect the money," says HMV's **Erin Yasgar**. "IDs will be checked."

Tower Records on Newbury Street sponsored its own AIDS Action Committee benefit last night with a **Betsy Johnson** fashion show. The BU Bookstore in Kenmore Square plans to stock one display copy of "Sex" at its service desk. Otherwise, says PR director **Erin Dowling**, copies of the book will be piled behind a counter.
