- WHEREAS: The four-day weekend festival, which features a lively parade and over 200 events, including the Saturday Performance Fair, celebrates students and faculty in the arts with an aim to galvanize the university arts community; and
- WHEREAS: David Hays, Harvard '52, founder of The National Theatre of the Deaf, will be honored with the 1999 Harvard Arts Medal, this medal is presented annually to a distinguished Harvard or Radcliffe alumnus or a faculty member who has made an outstanding contribution to the arts; and
- WHEREAS: This is also the 25th anniversary of The Office for the Arts at Harvard and Radcliffe, and, as part of its celebration, ARTS FIRST 99 will spotlight works of Harvard/Radcliffe alumni; and
- WHEREAS: The kick-off event is a modern dance concert to be held on Thursday, May 6 at 8:00 PM in Radcliffe's Reiman Center for the Performing Arts, along with the annual spring concert by Choreographers' Ink, the performing arm of the Radcliffe Dance Program, who will present original works by alumni dancers and choreographers; now therefore be it
- RESOLVED: That this City Council go on record acknowledging May 6, 1999 to May 9, 1999 as the seventh annual ARTS FIRST, Harvard and Radcliffe's arts celebration, and urges the City to remember and attend this four-day festival.
