yesterday's arraignment on new charges, assistant District Attorney Kim Gainsborough argued, holding Youngsworth on high by noting the defendant has 11 aliases and has a felony record that covers 10 pages dating to 1976. He has a history of delinquency on court appearances and yesterday had two outstanding warrants in Worcester and Quincy, Gainsborough said.

Lewis described his client as a victim of police harassment. He said Youngsworth is being unfairly "squeezed" by law enforcement agencies who searched his home and seized his property on July 8. Besides searching the premises, Randolph police used a backhoe to dig up Youngsworth's yard.

That search led to the new fire-arms charges, which Youngsworth

denies, saying that none of the three weapons was in working order.

Lewis said the museum-theft investigators should take his client seriously because of the role Youngsworth has claimed to have played in the return this summer of the missing beeswax seal of King Charles I of England that was on the founding charter of the Massachusetts Bay Colony. The seal was stolen 13 years ago.

Lewis is Youngsworth's fourth lawyer since his arrest in the 1996 case. Two of those attorneys said yesterday that he had never mentioned having information on the famed museum heist to them.

Attorney Martin Leppo, who withdrew from Youngsworth's 1996 case, citing "irreconcilable differences," said yesterday the topic never came up.

Man pleads guilty to chase charges

A Roxbury man who left a drug treatment center in November 1996 and led police on a high-speed car chase through Roxbury pleaded guilty to multiple charges in Superior Court yesterday. Joseph Guadarrama, 19, pleaded guilty to charges including five counts of assault with a dangerous weapon, a car, assault and battery with a dangerous weapon, leaving the scene of an accident after personal injury, receiving a stolen vehicle, and operating recklessly to endanger, the Suffolk district attorney's office said. He was sentenced to 2½ years in the Suffolk County House of Correction. (AP)

Drug bust yields cocaine, arrest

CAMBRIDGE - About 265 grams of cocaine with an estimated street value of \$25,000 were seized last night after an alleged drug supplier was arrested in Cambridge, police said. Manuel Martinez, 29, of East Boston, was arrested after an officer approached him after seeing him allegedly make a drug transaction. He ran, but was caught after a short chase.

N.Y. man pleads guilty to fraud

A New York man who bilked investors out of \$24 million in a Ponzi scheme pleaded guilty yesterday to 30 charges in US District Court in Boston. Harold Glantz, 64, admitted his role in the scheme, which involved selling fictitious "prime bank instruments," or standby letters of credit, to eight German investors. Glantz and two alleged co-conspirators, one from Swampscott, the other from London, are charged with using the money to finance lavish lifestyles. Glantz is to be sentenced Nov. 5.

Brawl leaves man seriously injured

NASHUA - A Nashua man suffered life-threatening injuries in a fight yesterday outside a restaurant, police said. Eric Dupont, 21, was hit in the head during a brawl early yesterday morning, Lieutenant Daniel Kerrigan said. The fight started after a woman was assaulted in the parking lot outside the Golden Dragon restaurant, he said. When police arrived at about 12:40 a.m., they found Dupont unconscious and bleeding from the head. He suffered a broken orbital bone - the bone protecting the eyesocket - and was listed in serious condition at Lahey Clinic in Burlington, Mass. The beating suspect had left the scene when police arrived, but three other people, all from Nashua, were arrested on unrelated charges, police said. (AP)

Body identified as R.I. fisherman

BRISTOL, R.I. - The body of a fisherman who fell overboard from a scalloper off Nantucket last month has been identified as John Belanger, 47, of Bristol. A Massachusetts state anthropologist identified the body through a tattoo on Belanger's arm and a hip injury, said State Police. Belanger was struck by a fishing line and knocked overboard July 22. His body was recovered July 31 by a fisherman off the coast of South Yarmouth, Mass., a few miles from the accident. A funeral Mass was held Monday at St. Elizabeth Church in Bristol; burial was in St. Mary Cemetery. (AP)
