# CRIME BEAT

## Man charged in crash that killed students

A 19-year-old Bedford man was indicted last week on drunken driving, motor vehicle homicide and other charges stemming from a high-speed crash in Lexington in July that killed two North Cambridge Catholic High School students.

The indictment Oct. 11 by a Middlesex County grand jury also charges Mark N. Moosick of Bedford with operating to endanger and driving after his license had been suspended.

Kathleen Azar, 18, of Arlington, and Lauren Higgins, 17, of Cambridge, both died of injuries suffered when the car, owned by Azar and driven by Moosick, struck a tree on Hancock Road in Lexington shortly after 10:30 pm on July 21. Azar was pronounced dead at the scene. Higgins died 12 days later.

David Capeless, a Middlesex County assistant district attorney, said Friday that a Bedford police officer tried unsuccessfully to stop the car for speeding after he saw Moosick driving it. Capeless said the officer followed the car three miles from Bedford to Lexington. Capeless said the officer tried to "maintain contact" with the car during the chase while trying to keep his own speed reduced.

Moosick was seriously injured in the crash and was admitted to the Lahey Clinic in Burlington before his transfer to a Boston hospital. Moosick's arraignment in Middlesex Superior Court has not been scheduled. He is represented by lawyer Peter DeGelleke.

## Community advisory

Cambridge Police Capt. Henry Breen advises residents of North Cambridge to secure their sheds and garages. Recently, there were three arrests in the Upland Road area for bicycle theft, he said. The arrests were made after a tip from an unidentified caller to the 911 police number.

"You don't have to leave your name," said Breen. If you see something suspicious in your neighborhood, "just call, and the police will respond," he said. Breen also advised that residents of the Brattle Street area in West Cambridge be alert. There were three burglaries in that area after midnight on Oct. 14, he said.

## City man charged in Belmont breaks

Early in the morning on Oct. 10, a resident of 362 Rindge Ave. was arrested by Belmont police and charged with breaking and entering at six homes in the Grove Street-Blanchard Road area.

Police said the man may be responsible for several nighttime breaks in West Cambridge. Cambridge police detective Edward L. Lyons said that over 150 nighttime breaks have occurred in the Belmont-West Cambridge area over the past year and a half, about 10 percent of those in Cambridge. They have usually occurred between 1:30 am and 5:30 am. The burglar usually enters the house through a back door or a back window.

Some of the breaks have been solved, but most have been attributed to the so-called "Belmont burglar." A man who was arrested in Belmont last week used the same method as the "Belmont burglar," but he does not fit the description that police have, said Lyons.

## No more shots in Columbia Park

A 17-year-old Columbia Terrace resident was arrested in his apartment on Thursday, Oct. 11, and charged with possession of cocaine with intent to distribute and unlawful possession of firearms and ammunition.

The arrest came after police executed a search warrant at the Columbia Terrace apartment. The search was the culmination of a four-week investigation begun after complaints of gunshots after dark in the Columbia Park area.

The investigation was conducted by Detective Gerald Baptist and

Detective Stan Gedaminsky, both of the police department's narcotics unit.

Gedaminsky said that he and Baptist received information that in Columbia Park, someone had been selling parsley as marijuana and baking soda as cocaine. When people would return to the park to get their money back, the "dealers" would fire shots in the air to scare them away, Gedaminsky said he was told.

The two detectives also received descriptions of three guns — a shotgun and two small pistols. The investigation first led the detectives to the Columbia Terrace apartment. During the Oct. 11 search, led by Sgt. Theodore Carlin, the shotgun and one of the pistols were found, said Gedaminsky. Also seized as evidence were ammunition, spent shotgun shells, a holster, a green leafy substance, a white powder, packaging paraphernalia, and pictures of the 17-year-old and another young man, for whom an arrest warrant has been issued, posing with all three guns, Gedaminsky said.

The green leafy substance and the white powder have yet to be analyzed, said police. One of the guns seized had been reported stolen from a North Cambridge residence in June, said Gedaminsky.

City Councilor Jonathan Myers commended the police for "the good work they did in this situation. I'd like to compliment them for that. Too often they don't get credit." "The neighborhood really felt under seige," Myers said. The police "saw this one through to completion," he said.

*Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:*

Chapter 8.56 entitled "Promotion of Non-Residential Solid Waste Reduction" is hereby amended by striking out Section 8.56.030 entitled "Advisory Committee on Environmentally Desirable Practices" and substituting in place thereof a new section 8.56.030 which reads as follows:

Advisory Committee on Environmentally Desirable Practices

1. There is hereby established in Cambridge an Advisory Committee on Environmentally Desirable Practices. The Committee will consist of eight members, of whom six will be appointed by the City Manager no later than two months after enactment of this Chapter. Of the six persons to be appointed,

three shall represent the community of for-profit and non-profit institutions in Cambridge; and

three shall be citizens who have demonstrated interest in municipal recycling and waste management.

Those three committee members representing the community shall be Cambridge residents and three committee members representing the institutional community shall either work or live in Cambridge.

In addition to the six appointed members, the Committee shall include

the Commissioner of Public Works or his designee; and

the Chairman or a member of the Cambridge Consumer Advisory Council.

2. The appointed members of the Committee shall serve for terms of two years, and an individual may serve for more than one term. The initial appointment of one member of the institutional community and one citizen recycler shall be for one year in order to stagger subsequent appointments. The City Manager may fill

vacancies on the Committee. Committee members shall serve without compensation.

3. The Committee shall hold regular meetings, shall inform the City Clerk of the time and place of such meetings, and shall publish notice of such meetings in a local newspaper at least one week prior to the meeting. A majority of the Committee shall constitute a quorum.

4. The City Manager shall provide the Committee sufficient administrative personnel and funding to carry out its responsibilities, which will be evaluated annually.

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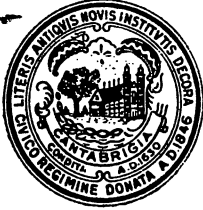

In amendment to an ordinance designated as the "Cambridge Municipal Code."

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:  
Chapter 2.52 of the Code (Police Department) is hereby amended by striking sections 2.52.010, 2.52.020 and 2.52.070 and replacing them with the following new sections 2.52.010, 2.52.020 and 2.52.070.

### 2.52.010 Police Commissioner - Authority

The Police Department shall be under the charge of a Police Commissioner who shall be the head of the Department and who shall, from time to time, make suitable regulations governing the Department and the officers thereof, subject to the approval of the City Manager. The Police Commissioner shall be in immediate control of all City property used by the Department, and of the police officers, who shall be assigned to their respective duties by the Police Commissioner, whose orders they shall obey. The Chief of Police shall be the next ranking officer of the Department and in the absence of the Commissioner, shall be the head of the Department.

### 2.52.020 Appointment - Removal - Compensation

a. The City Manager shall appoint the Police Commissioner and the Chief of Police. The Police Commissioner may be removed from

office at any time by the City Manager. The Chief of Police may be removed in accordance with applicable provisions of law.

b. The Police Commissioner shall receive such compensation as the City Manager shall from time to time establish.

2.52.070 Fees for Certain Permits and Other Documents

The Police Commissioner shall collect on behalf of the City the following fees:

a. For the issuance of permits for performance of work or labor on Sunday, twenty-five dollars.

b. For the issuance in duplicate of letters of police record for application for passports or other purposes, ten dollars.

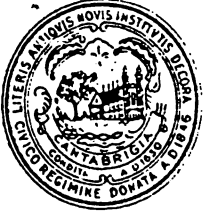

Chapter 8.56 of the Cambridge Ordinances passed last spring entitled "Promotional of Non-Residential Solid Waste Reduction" calls for the appointment of an Advisory Committee on Environmentally Desirable Practices, all of whom, with the exception of 2 city officials, should be residents of Cambridge. Three of the remaining six members shall be citizens and three shall represent the institutional community.

The Committee has not yet been appointed. The City Manager has reported to me that there are highly qualified applicants from the institutional community he might wish to appoint who are not Cambridge residents.

Since the objective of this Ordinance is to identify and share exemplary waste reduction practices among these institutions, I recommend a change in the Ordinance to allow non-Cambridge residents who work in Cambridge to serve.

Unless there is objection, I shall move that the sentence in paragraph 8.56.030 of Chapter 8.56 which reads:

"All six appointed members of the Committee shall be Cambridge residents"

be changed to read:

"Those three committee members representing the community shall be Cambridge residents and three committee members representing the institutional community shall either work or live in Cambridge."
