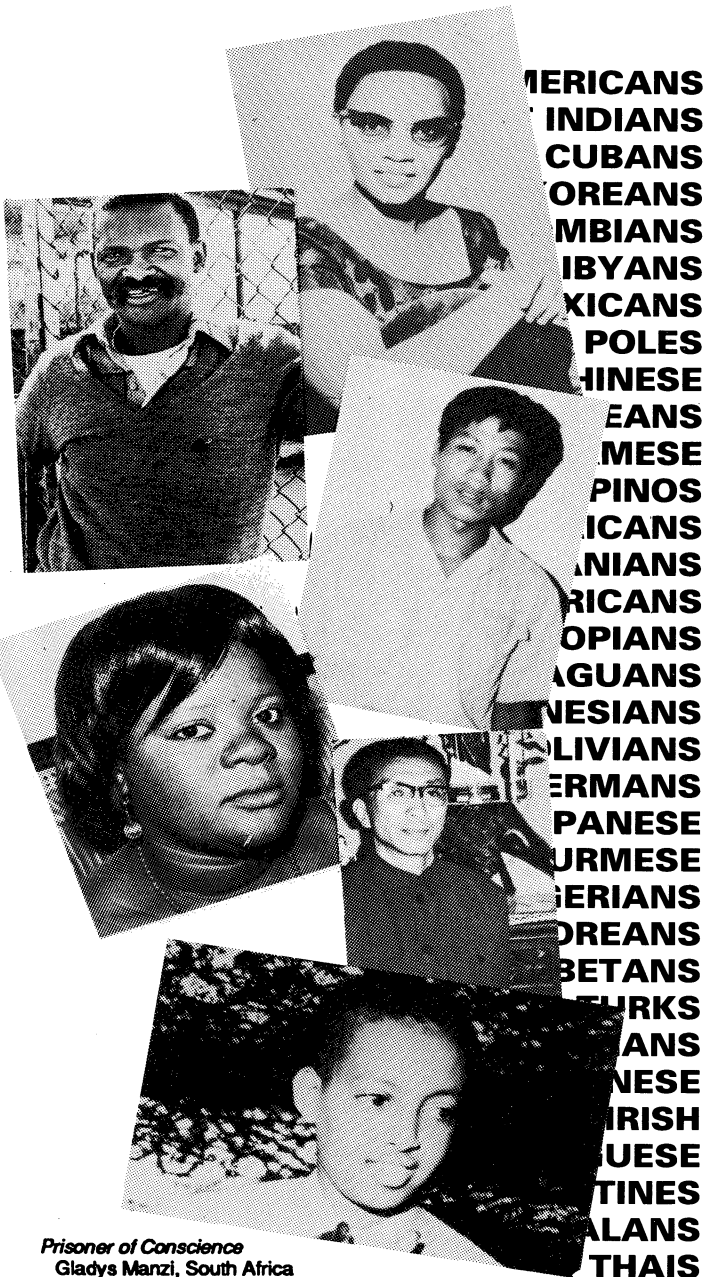


Amnesty International USA is for Everybody

What does AIUSA do?

AIUSA is a national section of Amnesty International (AI) the world's largest international human rights organization. AI works for the release of prisoners jailed for peacefully expressing their political or religious beliefs, or because of their race, ethnic origin, language or sex. Members of AIUSA write letters and organize efforts to free these "prisoners of conscience," as well as to stop governments worldwide from torturing or killing prisoners.

Why an Outreach Program?

Human rights is the proper concern of all people. Denial of any person's basic, universal rights erodes the principle of human rights for all people everywhere. AI has been active in defense of human rights since its founding in 1961, and in 1977 was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. Nevertheless, AIUSA's membership is not fully representative of the American people. The richness of ethnic and cultural diversity in America should become a key to strengthening the credibility, dynamism and depth of AIUSA's voice on behalf of those who have been silenced.

What can you do?

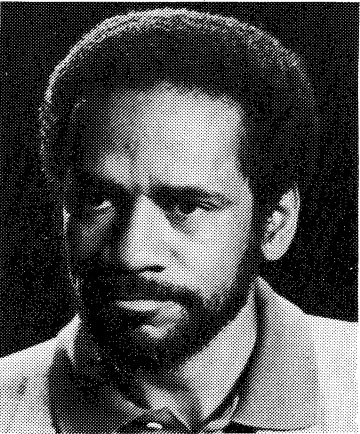

IN CITY COUNCIL

December 18, 1989

ORDERED: That in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Code of the City of Cambridge, Chapter 12.08, Section 12.08.020 the Superintendent of Streets be and hereby is authorized to grant a permit to Amnesty International Group #66 to set up a table on the sidewalk in front of Paperback Booksmith in Harvard Square on Sunday, December 31, 1989 from noon to 5:00 p. m. for the purpose of collecting signatures and donations to benefit Amnesty International endeavors, provided that no such permit shall be granted to exceed more than twenty-five percent of the width of the sidewalk from the property line of the premises in front of which said table shall be installed and provided further that before erecting the above named table, the petitioner shall file with the City Clerk a satisfactory bond in the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) conditioned to save harmless the City of Cambridge from all claims for damages arising from the construction, maintenance and use of said table.
