Reverend Thomas J. Williams served as a curate at the Church of St. John the Evangelist in North Cambridge for seventeen years, during which time he was known and loved by all who came in contact with him because of his great understanding and compassion for the sick and needy of his flock, and

WHEREAS:-

Since the date of his Ordination to the holy priesthood in 1937 by the late Cardinal O'Connell he was an inspiration to the people of his parish by his deep spirituality, and

WHEREAS:-

He was appointed as Administrator of the Parish of St. John the Evangelist in 1956 upon the death of the late Monsignor Hugh F. Blunt, and directed the rebuilding of the Parish Church destroyed by fire, a lasting memorial to his extraordinary efforts in behalf of his parishioners, and

WHEREAS:-

Reverend Thomas J. Williams served as Chaplain of the Cambridge Police Department, with the same vigor and deep interest which marked his priestly life, therefore be it

RESOLVED:-

That the Cambridge City Council in session assembled on September 23, 1963 go on record requesting that the ~~lot~~ ^{park} at Cedar and Dudley Streets be named in honor of the late Reverend Thomas J. Williams, and that said ~~lot~~ ^{park} be kept and maintained in a manner befitting a suitable memorial for this wonderful servant of God.
