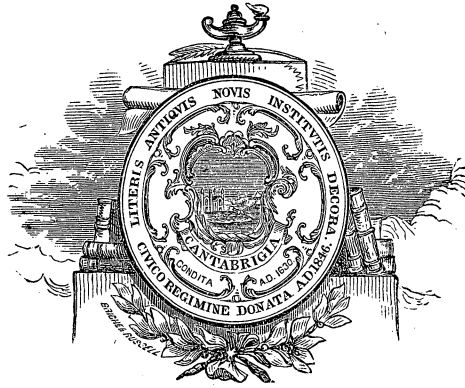


# CITY OF CAMBRIDGE.



In Board of Mayor and Aldermen, Dec. 21. 1870

WHEREAS, in the opinion of the Board, the safety and convenience of the inhabitants require that *Broadway* *shall be increased on the*  
*North Eastern side, nearly opposite Bowdoin Street*  
*should be*

it is therefore hereby Ordered, that due notice be given to *Mrs. Susan S. R.*  
*Weaver, and all other persons interested,*

that this Board intends to *increase* the Street before mentioned, by taking a  
portion of *the* land and laying out the same as a public street — and that  
*Wednesday, the 28<sup>th</sup>* day of *December* <sup>*current*</sup> at *8 1/2* o'clock,  
P. M., is assigned as the time for hearing any objections which may be made thereto.

To the Honorable Common Council of Cambridge;

The undersigned states unto your honorable body that as her petition was not granted by you, in which she requested that her house on Broadway, nearly opposite Boardman Street, might be allowed to remain in its present position until November 1st, 1871, she will obey the order of the city and remove her house. But she enters this protest against such removal, and states, and will be able abundantly to prove, that her said house has occupied its present position, under a claim of right and ownership, for upwards of forty years; whereby she has acquired title by peaceable adverse possession against the City of Cambridge to all the land upon which the house stands; and she will hold the City responsible for all the expenses of removal and repairing her house and premises, for the value of the land taken by the City, and for all other damages which have accrued or may accrue to her from the action of the city.

# City of Cambridge.

In Board of Aldermen, Dec 28. 1870.

Resolved, That the public convenience and necessity require that Broadway should be widened and straightened ~~at~~ on its North Eastern side, opposite Boardman Street.

Therefore Ordered, That Broadway be widened on its North Eastern side, by taking for this purpose about 114 feet of land here lying to Susan S. R. Weaver, being so much of her land as lies Southwesterly of the North Eastern line of Broadway, if straightened at that point, and laying out the same as a public Street and a part of Broadway.

Ordered, That damages for the land so taken be estimated and awarded as the sum of Fifty two dollars
