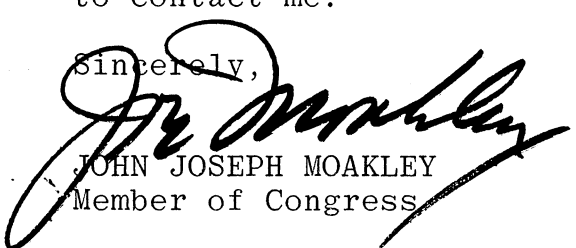
Thank you very much for forwarding to me the two orders that were adopted by the City Council of the City of Cambridge, Massachusetts on March 16, 1981.

With regard to the Atlanta murders, it is with great sadness that we have been witnessing such meaningless and senseless tragedy. I hope and pray that this situation is resolved in the very near future. A number of my colleagues and I sent a letter to the U.S. Attorney General expressing our concern about the recent upsurge of violent acts against black persons and in particular, the children of Atlanta who have been killed. We urged the Justice Department to conduct a full scale investigation into these gross violations of human rights so that we can put an end to these senseless killings.

Pursuant to your resolution concerning nuclear warfare, I would hope that the United States would be able to negotiate successfully with the Soviet Union to bring about an end to the production of nuclear weapons. I share your strong desire for world peace.

Again, thank you for contacting me. I am most grateful for the benefit of the Cambridge City Council's views on these crucial matters. If I may be of further assistance, please do not hesitate to contact me.
