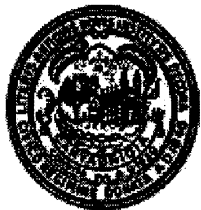

- WHEREAS: It has come to the attention of the Cambridge City Council that on Sunday, April 27, 2003, Suffolk County Sheriff Andrea J. Cabral will be honored by the Four Sisters Organization at Western Avenue Baptist Church; and
- WHEREAS: Sheriff Cabral was sworn in on November 29, 2002 as the 30th Sheriff in the history of Suffolk County, the first woman and the second persons of color in the Commonwealth's history to hold the position of Sheriff; and
- WHEREAS: Sheriff Cabral brings an extensive legal background and commitment to public safety to the job of Sheriff; and
- WHEREAS: Sheriff Cabral is responsible for the operation of the House of Correction, the Suffolk County Jail, the Suffolk County Women's Resource Center, the Suffolk County Community Corrections Center and the Civil Process Division; the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department employs more than 1,100 employees and has an average annual operating budget of \$100 million; and
- WHEREAS: Sheriff Cabral graduated from Suffolk Law School in 1986 and since that time she has had a broad range of experience in the public safety field, beginning with a staff attorney position at the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department and including work as an assistant district attorney in Middlesex County and then in Suffolk County, where she became the chief of the Domestic Violence Unit and in 1998, Chief of District Court and Community Prosecution; Sheriff Cabral also worked as an attorney in the Attorney General's Office; and
- WHEREAS: In 2002, Massachusetts Lawyers Weekly named Sheriff Cabral "Lawyer of the Year" now therefore be it
