WHEREAS:

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts spends over 5 million tax dollars in cleaning up litter annually, and

WHEREAS:

Over 70% of this litter is discarded bottles and cans, and

WHEREAS:

Referendum Question #6, the Massachusetts Bottle Bill proposes that all containers used to sell beer, carbonated soft drinks and mineral water be returnable for 5-10¢ in addition to prohibiting the use of detachable flip top which have become a dangerous nuisance, and

WHEREAS:

This bill will result in a substantial decrease in the cost and quantity of litter and solid waste disposal with additional savings of over \$2.8 annually in energy consumption, and

WHEREAS:

A study the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston indicated the cost of beverages in returnable bottles would show a small decline and a possible overall employment gain of 1,380 jobs and commensurate net payroll gain of some \$10 million dollars, now therefore be it

RESOLVED:

That I, Alfred E. Vellucci, as Mayor of the City of Cambridge, ask this City Council to endorse and support the Massachusetts Bottle Bill and let it further be

RESOLVED:

That all residents of the City of Cambridge are urged to vote yes on Question #6.
