- WHEREAS: April 20th marked the conclusion of the Fourth Annual National Minority Cancer Awareness Week; and
- WHEREAS: The National Cancer Institute estimates that the lives of almost 13,000 women of color could be saved over the next decade with regular checkups and early detection of breast and cervical cancer; and
- WHEREAS: This year's National Minority Cancer Awareness Weeks focused on the need for African American and Hispanic women aged 18 and over to learn more about prevention and treatment of those diseases; and
- WHEREAS: According to the National Cancer Institute, breast cancer is the leading cause of cancer deaths among African American women, and they are also three times as likely to develop cervical cancer, and twice as likely to die from it, as women of European descent; and
- WHEREAS: Latino women have twice the incidence of cervical cancer of women of European descent; and
- WHEREAS: The risk of developing both breast and cervical cancer increases with age, yet studies show that women of 50 years and older are less likely to have regular tests for these diseases; now therefore be it
- RESOLVED: That the City Council go on record in support of the goals of National Minority Cancer Awareness Week to encourage all women, and particularly women of color, to obtain the medical care necessary to prevent these cancers; and be it further
- RESOLVED: That this City Council will continue its efforts to ensure that this medical care is available to all Cambridge residents.
