WHEREAS: John began his political career with his election to the Cambridge School Committee in 1953; thereafter he was elected to the Massachusetts House of Representatives and served as a state representative from 1954 to 1961; and

WHEREAS: After his years in the House, John continued his political activities in the role of lobbyist and also practiced law; and

WHEREAS: Prior to opening a law office in Cambridge in 1989, he practiced at Center Plaza in Boston; and

WHEREAS: John was the co-founder and president of the Charles Bank Trust Company, which was established in 1966; and

WHEREAS: John was a lifelong parishioner of St. Paul's Church, where he served on several boards and was chairman of the finance committee that oversaw the restoration of the church; and

- WHEREAS: In 1997 the Cambridge City Council dedicated the intersection of Harvard and Quincy Street as "Representative John J. Campbell Square" in his honor; and

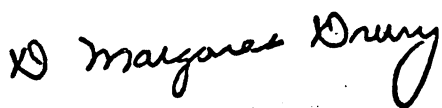

John J. Campbell, at 77; was state representative, lobbyist

John J. Campbell of Cambridge, a state representative, School Committee member, lobbyist and banker, died Wednesday. He was 77.

Born in Cambridge, Mr. Campbell attended Cambridge Rindge & Latin School. He graduated from Boston College in 1945 and Boston University Law School in 1949.

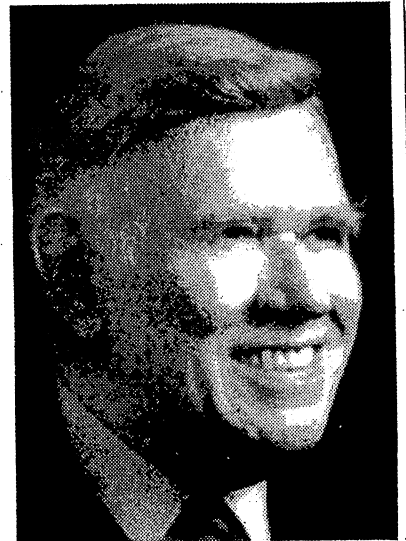
Mr. Campbell served in the Army during World War II. After the war, he joined the Air Force reserves, where he rose to the rank of major.

He was elected to the Cambridge School Committee in 1953. He served in the Massachusetts House from 1954 to 1961. After his years in the House, he worked as a lobbyist for Blue Cross-Blue Shield and the Massachusetts Wine and Spirits Wholesalers, in addition to other clients.

Mr. Campbell was also a lawyer. Prior to opening a law office in Cambridge in 1989, he practiced at Center Plaza in Boston.

He was the co-founder and president of the Charles Bank Trust Co., which was established in 1966.

A lifelong parishioner of St. Paul's Church, Campbell served on various boards there, and was chairman of the finance committee that oversaw the restoration of the church.
