SAMPLE PROCLAMATION FOR DAYS OF REMEMBRANCE

This is a composite of language drawn from Proclamations sent to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum by the nation's Governors and Mayors. Please note that the fiftieth anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising will be observed this year, as will armed resistance efforts in the killing centers of Treblinka and Sobibor.
