RESOLVED: That the City Clerk be and hereby is requested to forward a suitably engrossed copy of this resolution to each of the participants on behalf of the entire City Council.

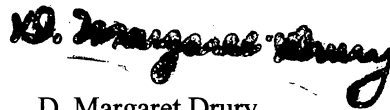

WHEREAS: The Johns Hopkins University Talent Search is designed to identify, assess, and recognize students with exceptional mathematical and/or verbal reasoning abilities; and

WHEREAS: Students scoring at or above the 97th percentile on a standardized test may apply to participate in the Talent Search; and

WHEREAS: In 1972, Dr. Julian Stanley, a psychology professor at The Johns Hopkins University, introduced the first talent search designed to identify, challenge, and reward academically able young people; and

WHEREAS: The Talent Search can help students, parents, and schools better understand a student's reasoning abilities. If students are scoring in the top three percentiles, they are "hitting the ceiling" of their regular tests. The Talent Search gives students the opportunity to take a test designed for older students, one with a higher ceiling. This testing will reveal more about their academic abilities and will allow them to compare their results with those of other highly able students. They will also learn about educational options and opportunities for students with their abilities, and they will receive recognition for their outstanding achievements; and

WHEREAS: The Talent Search hopes to "inspire young people by offering distinctive educational opportunities that nurture intellectual abilities, advance academic achievement, and enhance personal development"; and
