WHEREAS: Mr. Walker became a professor of studio art at University of Massachusetts-Boston in 1993 then later taught at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh and Oberlin College in Oberlin, Ohio; and

WHEREAS: During his career, he had many solo exhibitions in Boston and Chicago, as well as internationally; his work was shown in the Smithsonian Institution, Houghton Library of Harvard University, the Boston Public Library, the Addison Gallery of American Art, and the Art of the Book Collection at Yale University; now therefore be it
