

The Cape Ann Granite Company and the City of Cambridge have this day agreed as follows:-

The said Cape Ann Granite Company agrees to furnish such number of granite paving blocks, three hundred thousand, more or less, as may be desired by said Cambridge, during the year 1886, the stone to be equal in quality to the best Cape Ann or Quincy Granite, and the blocks to be of the following dimensions:- width three and one-half to four inches: length six to eight inches, depth seven and one-half to eight inches. all the edges to be sharp and straight, forming right angles at their intersection, both horizontally and vertically;- the faces to be straight split and free from bunches or depressions. Each and every block to be equal both as regards quality and finish, conforming to the sample furnished to the Committee on roads and bridges of said Cambridge by said company, and to be in every respect satisfactory to said Committee and to the Superintendent of streets of said Cambridge.

Said blocks are to be delivered at the City wharf or Fisk's wharf and main street, in said Cambridge, near the West Boston Bridge, at such times and in such quantities as may be required by said Superintendent of streets, and the said company shall forfeit and pay as liquidated damages to said Cambridge, fifty dollars for each and every day it shall neglect to deliver such stones at the times and in the quantities thus required.

The City of Cambridge agrees to pay the Cape and Granite Company aforesaid, thirty-eight dollars and seventy-four cents for each and every thousand stones so furnished.
