WHEREAS: Immunization is a vital but often under-utilized tool for ensuring the health of our children; and

WHEREAS: Immunization survey data prepared by the Massachusetts Immunization Program indicate that only 44 to 63% of Cambridge children were fully immunized at age two; and

WHEREAS: Throughout the country, April 23-29 is being celebrated as National Pre-School Immunization week; and

WHEREAS: The Immunization Action Project of The Cambridge Hospital has the goal of improving the rate of immunization by 10% among children aged two years and younger living in Cambridge, Chelsea, and Somerville; and

WHEREAS: The Immunization Action Project will attempt to achieve this goal through mutually supportive liaisons with existing community outreach programs, education and outreach efforts, language appropriate literature and radio outreach, local "Children's Day" health events, and the coordination of immunization activities with other support services to target minority, immigrant, and economically disadvantaged children; now therefore be it

RESOLVED: That this Cambridge City Council does hereby declare the week beginning on April 23, 1994 and ending April 29, 1994 to be "National Pre-School Immunization Week" throughout the City of Cambridge; and be it further

RESOLVED: That this Cambridge City Council expresses its strongest support for the Immunization Action Project and all other efforts to immunize our nation's children.
