- WHEREAS: There are 74 million Americans 40 years of age or older who have worked hard to get where they are today and to get us a community and a nation where we are and during their years of work they have learned a great deal, have gained invaluable experience and have come to appreciate a good job and to be proud of doing a good job, and
- WHEREAS: Many of these people, though, are having difficulty finding work for no reason other than that there is a prejudice against older workers, and
- WHEREAS: The Federal Government is now working to eliminate this unfounded discrimination against older workers, now therefore be it
- RESOLVED: That I, Alfred E. Vellucci, Mayor of the City of Cambridge, do hereby ask this City Council to endorse the efforts of our Federal Government on behalf of the older workers and designate March 14-20, 1982 as NATIONAL EMPLOY THE OLDER WORKER WEEK here in Cambridge, and be it further
- RESOLVED: That all employers of this area are urged to give special consideration to the skills and qualifications of those men and women 40 years of age and older.
