

City of Cambridge.

In the year eighteen hundred and seventy three.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:-

Sec. 1 The tenant, occupant, and in case there shall be no tenant, the owner, agent, or person having the care of any building or lot of land bordering on any street, lane, court square, or public place within the City, where there is any footway or sidewalk, shall cause all the snow and ice to be removed from such sidewalk.

If the snow shall fall in the daytime, it shall be removed from the sidewalk within four hours from the time it shall have ceased falling; if in the night time, it shall be removed by twelve o'clock at noon of the ^{day} succeeding; and all ice shall be removed within twenty four hours after the same shall form upon the sidewalk.

And this section shall apply to snow or ice which may have fallen from any building, and to ice formed

from water running or accumulating upon any
sidewalk -

Sec. 2 The twenty sixth section of the twenty fifth
chapter of the Revised Ordinances of said City
shall be and the same is hereby repeated.
