New Englanders join science elite

Sixteen New England-based researchers were among 60 new members elected yesterday to the National Academy of Sciences, along with 15 foreign associates from 10 countries.

A total of 1,798 individuals, chosen on the basis of their achievements in original research, are currently members of the prestigious society. Established in 1863, the society is a private organization, but by congressional act it is the federal government's official on-call adviser in science and technology matters.
