WHEREAS:

The City Council has been notified of the death of Edwin A. Cutting, a former member of the City Government, and a well known and highly respected citizen, it is fitting and proper that notice be taken of the sad event.

Mr. Cutting was born in Cambridge seventy-three years ago and, with the exception of three years, has always resided here. He was elected to the Common Council of 1895 and again in 1901 and 1902. He was always an active member in the life of the community and especially so in the affairs of the Pilgrim Congregational Church. In the business world he was identified for many years with A. H. Brown and Brothers, flour merchants of Boston.

He was a man of positive opinions yet he never antagonized those with whom he came in contact, his friendships were many and enduring, his sincerity and honesty were ever apparent. It is therefore

That the City Council hereby acknowledges the loss sustained by the city and countless friends in every walk of life in the passing away of Edwin A. Cutting and directs that a copy of these resolutions be spread upon the records.
