- WHEREAS: Jewel Hairston Bell, a beloved and respected Cambridge resident, died on August 4, 1990 after a lengthy illness which did not, however, squelch her indomitable spirit; and
- WHEREAS: Jewel Bell fought for equality and quality in all facets of life and most especially in education; and
- WHEREAS: Jewel Bell was most recently the Director of Tufts University's African American Center, and was previously Director of the Council on Minority Education at the University of Oregon, an educational specialist for the Bureau of Equal Opportunity of the Massachusetts Department of Education and for the METCO program in Newton Public Schools; and
- WHEREAS: Jewel Bell earned a degree with honors from Margaret Harrison College at the Carnegie Institute of Technology and completed social work training at Case Western Reserve; and
- WHEREAS: Jewel Bell showed her community spirit through work on a variety of community organizations--including the Board of Directors of the Cambridge Visiting Nurse Association, as a parent in the Cambridge Public Schools, and on the Advisory Committee of Public Television and Radio Station WGBH; and
- WHEREAS: Along with all these commitments, Jewel's perceptive, intelligent, and caring spirit gave support and strength to her family and friends; now therefore be it
- RESOLVED: That the Cambridge City Council hereby honors the life of Jewel Hairston Bell and sends sincere condolences to her family--her husband, Derrick Bell; her three sons, Derrick, III, Douglas, and Carter; and to her sister Jessica Gifford; and be it further
- RESOLVED: That the City Clerk be and hereby is requested to prepare a suitably engrossed copy of this resolution to be presented to her family.
