IN CITY COUNCIL

January 15, 1973

Whereas, the United States of America is continuing the ill-conceived war in Vietnam, and,

Whereas, the United States is neither under attack nor under the threat of attack from North Vietnam, and,

Whereas, in addition to the hundreds of thousands of civilian casualties, the war has cost the United States over 300,000 casualties including almost 50,000 deaths, and,

Whereas, the economic cost of the war is over 100 billion dollars at a time when there are pressing domestic needs for our limited resources, and,

Whereas, the prolonging of the war and the continuation of the bombing in any part of Indochina endangers American prisoners of war, and,

Whereas, this conflict is being fought without the benefit of a declaration of war, therefore be it

Resolved, that the Cambridge City Council in a meeting assembled memorializes the President and the Congress for an immediate end to the war in Vietnam, and be it further

Resolved, that the Cambridge City Council endorses the massive, peaceful, legal demonstration to be held on January 20, Inauguration Day, in Washington D.C., and be it further

Resolved, that we call further attention to this as a significant form of protest and urge those who are so inclined to join in.
