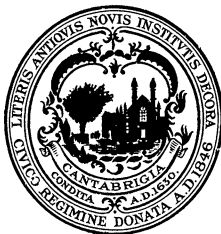
There is a great call and need for the opening of the baths in the Thorndike School for the use of the children in East Cambridge during the months of July and August, the baths to be open from 9 o'clock A.M. until 4.30 o'clock P.M. every day except Saturday, and on Saturday from 9 o'clock A.M. until 4 o'clock P.M.

The opening of these baths will incur an expense of about \$500, which, I am informed by certain members and agent of the Board, we cannot under the law expend for such purpose. I would respectfully suggest, therefore, if you think it desirable that the baths be used, that you appropriate \$500 and give 3,000 children in East Cambridge the benefit of these baths during the hot weather.

As the care and direction of the baths for the school children and for the men in the evenings are under the School Board, I would respectfully suggest that the summer baths be placed under its care and direction.

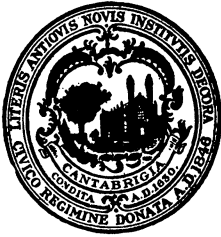

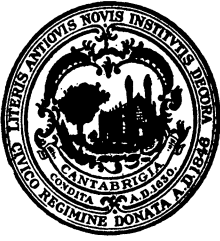

Gentlemen:-

The result of opening the bids for the construction of a fire station in Inman Square in accordance with an order of the City Council dated November 26, 1912 and approved March 8, 1913, is herewith submitted:-

As will be seen from the above figures, the cost of the proposed building will exceed the \$45,000.00 appropriation made for this work. The building as planned, provides for fireproof construction throughout. The presence of the fire alarm headquarters in the building made it desirable that this form of construction be favored over any other cheaper type. If the building is to be constructed upon the present lines, it will be necessary to secure an additional appropriation of \$10,000.00.

By changing to a non-fireproof building with a plain brick exterior and without a bell tower, it is possible to building within the appropriation.

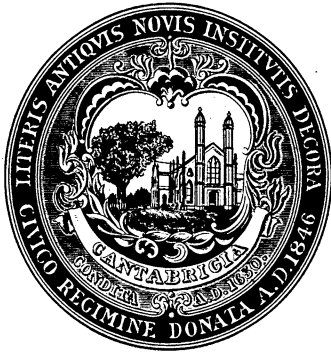

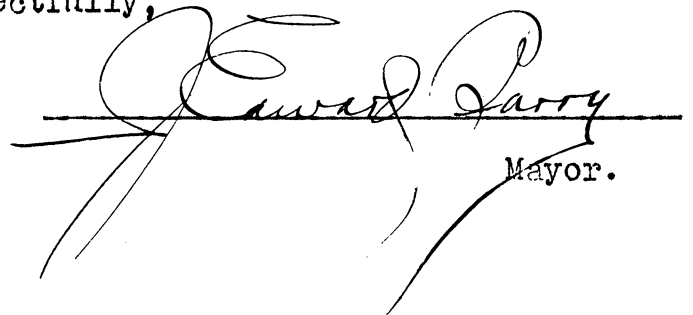
