A N A C T

To regulate the transportation of gunpowder within and through the city of Cambridge.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

Section 1. The city council of the city of Cambridge are hereby authorised to make and establish by-laws and ordinances, from time to time, relative to the times and places at which gunpowder may be brought to or carried from said city, by land or by water; the times when, and the manner in which the same may be transported through said city; to direct and regulate the kind of carriages, boats and other vehicles, in which the same may be so brought to, carried from, and transported through said city; to direct and require all such precautions as may appear to them needful and salutary to guard against danger in the transportation thereof to, from,

and through said city; and to annex to such by-laws and ordinances suitable penalties not exceeding one hundred dollars, for any one breach thereof.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the city council of said city, to cause all such by-laws and ordinances as they may make and establish, by virtue of the authority given by this act, to be published in two or more newspapers printed in the county of Middlesex, two weeks successively, for the information and government of all persons concerned.

Section 3. This act shall take effect from its passage, and all acts and parts of acts inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed.
