

City of Cambridge,

In the year One Thousand Eight Hundred  
and Seventy Four,

An Ordinance in relation to Collection of Junk.

It is ordained by the City Council of the  
City of Cambridge, as follows,

Chapter Fourteen of the Revised Ordinances  
is hereby amended, by striking out the  
second section thereof, and inserting in its  
place the following,

Section 2. No person shall, without a  
license from the Mayor and Aldermen, col-  
lect or deal in junk, old metals, rags, or  
second hand articles; and every wagon, cart,  
sleigh, sled, or other vehicle used in the  
collection of junk, old metals, rags, or second  
hand articles, shall have the owner's name  
and number of his license placed upon  
the outside of each side thereof, in plain  
legible words and figures of not less than  
one and one-half inches in length, and so  
that the same may be distinctly seen,

No holder of such license shall,  
directly or indirectly, either purchase, or  
receive by way of barter or exchange, any

of the articles aforesaid, of any minor  
or apprentice, knowing, or having reason to  
believe, him to be such; and said vehicles  
shall at all times be subject to the  
inspection of the Mayor and Aldermen, or  
of any person by them authorized.

Said licenses shall not be trans-  
ferable; and the person receiving a license for  
the collection of junk, shall pay for the  
same, to the use of the City of Cambridge,  
a fee of Five Dollars.
