Center for Adult Education Combines Access with Historical Preservation

The grand re-opening of the Cambridge Center for Adult Education (CCAE) main building at 42 Brattle Street will celebrate "a wonderful example of how accessible design can be merged harmoniously with historical preservation," says Michael Muehe, Executive Director of the Cambridge Commission for Persons with Disabilities. Ceremonies in the new Garden Courtyard of Brattle House are scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 8th at 1 p.m.



Construction Progress at CCAE

For over 100 years, first as the Cambridge Social Union, CCAE has enjoyed this great Harvard Square location in one of the ten oldest houses in the City of Cambridge. The building was constructed around 1727 for William Brattle and occupied as a residence until 1889. It is the only 18th century house on its block and one of just four early Georgian houses surviving in Cambridge. But as the site for an educational institution serving the public, this old building posed many barriers for people with mobility

impairments. "We want to be accessible to the public in all kinds of ways," said CCAE Executive Director James H. Smith. "Physical access is the biggest challenge."

Now with the September completion of major renovations, individuals with disabilities will have vastly improved access to CCAE classes. The historical nature of Brattle House has been preserved and the new landscape echoes the estate's early reputation for its wonderful gardens. Along with a gently sloping walkway, a ramp and an accessible main entrance the new design incorporates traditional materials like the old paving bricks and reintroduces Colonial-era plantings. This gardening project restores an oasis of urban greenery while new lighting enhances the building's historic façade both day and night.

The Georgian character of the house has been maintained, and improved access for people with disabilities has been achieved. Such "successful adaptation to change... mark it as a significant example of historic preservation in Cambridge," says Smith.

Third Graders Get Lesson in Disability and Diversity

How do you get in your car? How does your guide dog know when the traffic light turns green? My sister has a broken arm - is that a disability? What a lot of perceptive questions these third graders had for the Commission for Persons with Disabilities.

During the month of May, as part of our goal to educate people in the community about disability and access issues, Commission members, staff and nine additional volunteers visited 28 classes in thirteen Cambridge elementary schools. Kim DeAndrade of the CPS Health Education Office has worked with the Disability Commission for the last several years to coordinate these sessions with the third grade teachers.

Carolyn Thompson, Disability Project Coordinator, says that children are curious and trying to make sense of the differences they encounter. From the adults in their lives they will either learn to fear and ridicule the people and situations that are unfamiliar, or gain an appreciation of the wonderful diversity of people in the world about them. "We hope these visits help the kids become more comfortable around people with physical, mental and sensory impairments and more knowledgeable about the technology and ways we do things that can eliminate barriers for people with disabilities," said Thompson.

This program was launched with the third grade because they use a health education curriculum supplement called *The Great Body Shop* that has a unit each spring on disability issues. "We are exploring ways to expand these class visits to more grade levels and would be interested in conversations with other groups as well," says Michael Muehe, Executive Director of the Commission for Persons with Disabilities.
