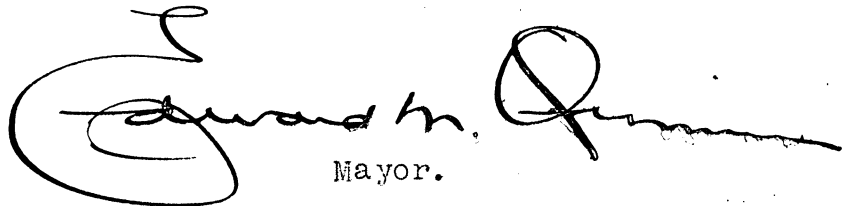
The Honorable, the City Council:

WHEREAS:

A communication has been received from His Honor the Mayor announcing the death on December 6th of Stephen H. Harrington, a member of the Board of Park Commissioners and former member of the City Government, the City Council desires to join in their testimony to the merits of their deceased friend and associate.

Mr. Harrington was born in New Hampshire in 1854, at an early age moved to Cambridge and, for a period of thirty years, was a leader in the business life of the city. In 1903 he was elected as a member of the Board of Aldermen and served for two years. In 1913 and 1914 he was a member of the General Court and for the past six years has served as a member of the Board of Park Commissioners.

He was for years active in the social and fraternal life of the city, being a member of the Cambridge Lodge of Elks, the Ancient Order of Hibernians, the Knights of Columbus, the National Irish Forresters, Inman Square Business Men's Association and Furniture Dealers' Association.

He was a man of positive opinions yet he never antagonized those with whom he came in contact and his voice, vote and influence were always heard advocating any cause thought to be for the betterment of the community. His friendships were many and enduring and his pleasing personality was manifested by the large circle of friends who mourn his loss. It is therefore
