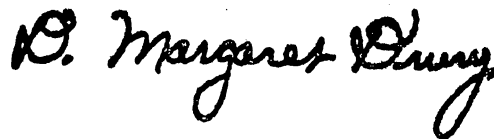

WHEREAS: The United States was founded in 1945, and the anniversary of its founding is observed each year on October 24; and

WHEREAS: One of the principal mandates of the United Nations – “To achieve international cooperation in solving problems of an economic, social, cultural, or humanitarian character” – remains as valid today as when those words were written into the Charter more than a half century ago; and

WHEREAS: In September of 2000, 189 countries, including the United States, agreed on the Millennium Development Goal; and

WHEREAS: The fourth of the Millennium Development Goals focuses on the reduction of child mortality, and seeks to reduce by two-thirds the mortality rate among children under five by 2015; and

WHEREAS: Poor children’s health has a permanent and lasting affect on future generations; and

WHEREAS: The United States is a champion of children’s rights, most recently in its work in South Africa, Afghanistan and Iraq; and

WHEREAS: The United States must continue to work with the United Nations and UN agencies in order to provide a coordinate, multilateral effort in both assessing the current problem of children’s health and survival and determining the strategies and mechanisms best suited to reduce child mortality and improve children’s health; and

WHEREAS: The United Nations Association of the United States of America (UNA-USA), in cooperation with other organizations, has declared “Child Health and Survival” as its theme for the 2005 United Nations Day commemorations; and
