Most Honorable Mayor of the City of Cambridge:

For several years now, I have held the honorable position of Mayor of the City of Anqing, in the province of Anhui, China. My staff and I have a goal to create and maintain a city where industry is high, educational opportunities are abundant and cultural exchange is diverse. As you know, cities and their citizens can only thrive and grow with informational and cultural exchanges. In October of 1985, we had the honor of establishing a very successful friendship-city with Ibaraki, Japan. It is our dream now, to establish a sister-city with the City of Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Perhaps you are not familiar with our city. We are a relatively small city with a population of 5.9 million, which is small for China, and which makes us feel in some ways comparable to your city. Anqing is in the province of Anhui on the northern bank of the Yangtze river. We boast a 2,000 year history and the birth-place of Huangmei opera, a sort of offshoot of Beijing opera. Our main products are rice, cotton and tea. Tourists from all over China and some from abroad come to visit our natural landmarks, such as Tianzhu Mountain, or our religious landmarks, including Yingjiang Temple, a Buddhist temple of over 1,000 years.

These are only a few aspects of our city. One area of rapid growth is in education and scientific research. I met Dr. Xiping Xu over five years ago, and was very enthusiastic to support his scientific collaborations in the field of reproductive health and genetic studies on chronic diseases. I already feel well-acquainted with the City of Cambridge since I have hosted many visitors from your city, including over 20 professors from Harvard University, M.I.T. and Millennium Pharmaceuticals, Inc. At present, six collaborative scientific research projects are being conducted in Anqing, between our researchers, Harvard University and M.I.T. Dr. Xu's research has created a wonderful opportunity for our scientists, teachers and medical professionals. Over 1,000 physicians and scientists have been involved in this research with Harvard to better understand these universal environmental health issues which concern research scientists worldwide. As Mayor of the City of Anqing, I thoroughly supported the development of the Harvard/Anqing Eco-genetic and Reproductive Health Center in our city, which employs and utilizes some of our top scientists and health experts from the Anqing Health Bureau and surrounding hospitals and

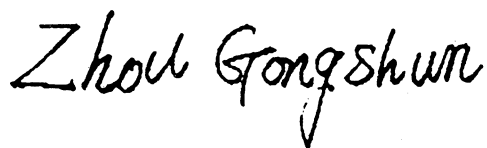
universities. This month, Dr. Xu, along with his colleagues, Drs. Mike McElroy and Geoffrey Duyk, will visit the city of Anqing to discuss additional research opportunities. They will be met by the provincial governor and I enthusiastically welcome them once again and strongly support their collaborative research efforts.

Education is the basis for a strong community. As Mayor of Cambridge, a city which houses such great schools as M.I.T. and Harvard, you must be proud that your city is living proof of the value of education. The cultural and intellectual diversity of Cambridge is one of its many strengths. We, in the city of Anqing, have placed much emphasis on the fields of education and scientific research. At present, there are 47 scientific research institutes employing 40,000 scientists. We have one university and 731 medical units with over 10,000 professional health workers.

Of course, our greatest resource is the people of Anqing. Our people have worked and trained hard to make our city what it is today. It is our belief that through the exchange of knowledge, cultures and opportunities, an individual learns his true value and a community learns its true potential. I believe that an international exchange between the cities of Cambridge and Anqing would greatly benefit the people of both communities. In this age of global economic growth, it is important that cities all over China make an effort to reach out to citizens and government officials in cities abroad, such as the United States, to improve and enhance current relations and to achieve a cross-cultural understanding.

We hope you will seriously consider this sister-city relationship. It would be an honor for our city and our people. I hope someday in the near future, you can be a guest-of-honor in our city.

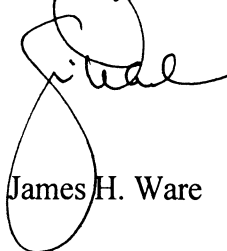
Dear Mayor Doyle-Russell:

I write to ask that you give serious consideration to the proposal by Dr. XiPing Xu, Associate Professor at the Harvard School of Public Health, that the City of Cambridge become a "sister city" of Anqing, China. Anqing is one of China's largest cities and an important center of industry and culture. The Harvard School of Public Health has, over an extended period, developed a strong scientific relationship with physician scientists based in Anqing. Among four studies currently under way, two are funded by Millennium Pharmaceuticals, a Cambridge-based company that is rapidly emerging as an international leader in population-based genetic research. You may recall that Millennium was in the news recently because of discoveries related to the "obesity" gene. A third study is supported by the National Institutes of Health.

As home to Harvard University and MIT, as well as Millennium, Hybridon, and Biogen, Cambridge is one of the most important centers for biotechnology in the United States. The city of Anqing is emerging as a center for biotechnical research in China. A sister-city relationship will facilitate the developing collaboration with scientists at Harvard and at Millennium and will also create a broad range of other opportunities for cultural and scientific exchange. It is our intention that this relationship would not involve costs to or financial commitments by the City of Cambridge.

I understand that Dr. Xu and his colleagues will be meeting with you on Thursday morning. Thank you for your willingness to entertain their proposal.

Dear Mayor Doyle-Russell,

I write to offer my endorsement to the proposal led by Prof. Xiping Xu of the Harvard School of Public Health to establish a sister city relationship between Cambridge and Anqing, Anhui, China. I chair the Harvard University Interfaculty Initiative on Environment, one of five major programs begun by President Neil Rudenstine to build interdisciplinary education and research between the University's many schools and departments. The primary research venture of this initiative is the China Project, which explores a number of linked issues in economic growth, energy use and environmental protection in China, and their role in Sino-American relations. It is a fully collaborative effort between Harvard and six research and policymaking institutions in the People's Republic of China. It involves over fifteen senior Harvard faculty from the natural and applied sciences, economics, law, political science, government, business, sociology, and East Asian Studies, along with participants from M.I.T, Boston University, and other U.S. universities. The project is sponsored or endorsed by senior policymakers in both Beijing and Washington. Prof. Xu and I co-chair this exciting, expanding venture, raising to date roughly \$2 million in research funding from private and public sources.

American perceptions of China, the world's greatest growth economy, tend to focus excessively on one segment of its society, the booming mega-cities of Beijing and coastal China. We think it is imperative in our own project and more generally to gain a deeper understanding of conditions of life for the more typical Chinese citizen. To this end, we have chosen to launch a research focus on a smaller municipality, Anqing, as the locale for a long-term, special relationship with the Harvard China Project. Among other reasons for this choice, Anqing has a reputation for responsible municipal government and a balanced but proactive interest in environment. We are just initiating the first of what we expect to be a number of research ventures in the city beyond Prof. Xu's many health studies. The new project is a survey of a random sample of Anqing citizens as to environmentally-related personal health, economic status, household energy use, and their link to popular perceptions of environment, legal recourse over pollution problems, and the role of local government institutions. We recently hosted a government delegation from Anqing to settle this plan, and at the end of the month, I will travel to Anqing with Prof. Xu to further strengthen our new relationship with municipal authorities. I wholeheartedly encourage you to consider Prof. Xu's proposal to build on these unique scholarly links and other ties to Anqing toward an even more exciting government-to-government relationship.

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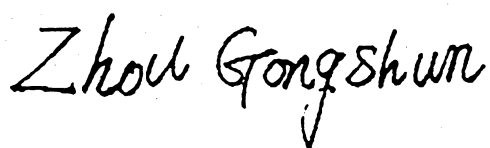
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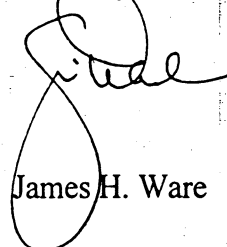
