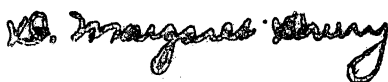

WHEREAS: The Mullen family lived here at 19 Rindgefield Street; and

WHEREAS: Dr. Lawrence Mullen, fondly known around the City as Dr. Larry, was born in Cambridge on September 12, 1909. Dr. Mullen served his country proudly during WWI as a Major in the US Army Medical Corps. Dr. Lawrence had a Family Medical Practice in North Cambridge. He spent many years delivering hundreds of babies. He was famous for his house calls and his wonderful bedside manner. Dr. Lawrence and Rita Mullen had two wonderful children: Pricilla and Lawrence Jr. Dr. Larry and Rita also raised his nieces Elaine and Cynthia for a number of years. They were blessed with two grandchildren: Justin and Caitlin Riley and are soon to have a great-grandchild. Dr. Mullen was a proud member of St. John's Church and the various Veteran's organizations throughout the City; and

WHEREAS: Mary (Mullen) Anderson was born on August 26, 1905 in Cambridge. Mary married James J. Anderson in 1941. Mary was a teacher in Cambridge, Boston and Sudbury. For ten years she was the co-owner and manager of Anderson Cleaners in Hyde Park. She was very active in her church, particularly knitting for the charity bazaars. Mary was an avid traveler throughout her life; and

WHEREAS: Thomas Mullen was born in Cambridge on June 3, 1915 at 19 Rindgefield Street. Thomas married Norma M. Stacey in November of 1942 at St. John's Church. They were blessed with two children: Elaine and Cynthia. From these two children came five grandchildren: Katherine and Peter Reale, and Mark, Matthew and Sarah Cassinelli. From these grandchildren came two great-grandchildren, Matthew Mercier and Andrew DePasquale. Thomas served in the US Army during WWII. Thomas was the Chief Administrative Assistant to Speaker of the House Thomas P. (Tip) O'Neill. Thomas was a member of the United American Veterans Post in Cambridge; now therefore be it
