

Sec. 17-32. Awnings, canopies, clothes lines.

No canopy or awning shall hereafter be erected or maintained within the limits of any street, without the written permission of the Superintendent of Streets authorized by the City Council, except a canopy or awning, constructed of cloth or canvas attached to an iron frame, securely fastened and supported from above and with no part less than nine (9) feet above the level of the sidewalk over which it is placed. No clothes dryer or clothes lines, and no clothes or garment shall be hereafter placed or hung over a sidewalk or within the limits of any street without the written permission of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Sec. 17-33. Saving City harmless from claims for damages because of coal holes or other excavations under sidewalks.

Every owner of any estate who maintains any cellar, vault, coal hole or other excavation under the part of the street adjacent to or which is a part of, his estate, shall do so only on condition that such maintenance shall be considered as an agreement on his part to hold the City harmless from any claim for damages to himself or the occupants of the estate resulting from gas, sewage or water leaking into such excavation, and every owner who maintains a post, pole or other structure in or over a street, or a wire, pipe, conduit or other structure under a street, shall do so only on the condition that such maintenance shall be considered as a agreement on his part to keep the same and the covers thereof in good repair and condition, at all times

That, in accordance with the provisions of an ordinance relative to placing and maintaining signs, the Commissioner of Public Works be and hereby is authorized to grant a permit to Leather & Silver Designs, Inc. for the erection of a ^{canopy} sign at 1105 Massachusetts Avenue, Cambridge.

Provided that, before erecting the above named sign, the petitioner shall obtain a permit from the Building Department and file with the City Clerk a satisfactory bond in the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) conditioned to save harmless the City of Cambridge from all claims for damages arising from the construction, maintenance and use of said sign.
