

City of Cambridge.

In the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven.

An Ordinance,
for the suppression of disturbances on the
Lord's Day.

Be it ordained by the city council of the
city of Cambridge, as follows:-

Sect. 1. Every person, who shall, on the
Lord's Day, race, or ride, or drive, for trial of
speed, any horse or other animal of the horse
kind, on any street or highway in the city, or
who shall, by the careless, immoderate or disor-
-derly riding or driving of any such horse or other
animal, whether harnessed to any gig, chaise, or
other vehicle, or not, or by noises, shouts, or out-
-cries, on any such street or highway, disturb the
public peace, or shall molest or endanger any
person in going to or returning from public
worship, or shall obstruct, annoy or interrupt
any person in the free and quiet enjoyment
of his religious rights and privileges, shall,
upon conviction thereof, forfeit and pay a
sum not less than five dollars, nor more than
twenty dollars.

Sect. 2. Every person, found in any
street or highway in the city, on the Lord's Day,
committing any of the offences mentioned in
the preceding section, may be apprehended by
any constable, police officer, or any other person,
by order of the Mayor or any Justice of the Peace

within the County of Middlesex, without written Warrant, and kept in custody not exceeding twenty-four hours, by or at the expiration of which time, such person shall be taken before some Justice of the Peace, and proceeded against in the manner provided by law.
