The undersigned would respectfully represent, that in consequence of the removal of land adjoining his premises on Lee Street ^{by the City} he has been subjected to considerable additional ~~expense~~ expense in maintaining his fence on the line of said street, and that it is probable that it will soon fall down, unless something is done to render it as secure as it was before the action of the City in removing the earth, by which it had in part been supported, for more than thirty years. He therefore asks your honorable body to take such action on their part as shall be deemed just & proper, in relation thereto.
