Critic's reviews brimmed with enthusiasm

Arthur Hepner, a journalist, editor, and contributor to The Boston Globe, died Friday in the Presentation Rehabilitation and Nursing Home in Brighton, after a short illness. He was 87.

Mr. Hepner crowded several lifetimes into one. Born in Brooklyn in 1914, he graduated from Harvard University, class of '38.

After freelancing as a reporter in New York, he spent many years on the staff of the St. Louis Post Dispatch, where he was part of a Pulitzer Prize-winning team that reported on a coal-mine disaster. His work in St. Louis took him to assignments in Latin America and in Europe; in 1946 he received one of the first Nieman Fellowships.

Later Mr. Hepner moved to New York, where he wrote for the Herald Tribune until moving into radio and early television. He was a war correspondent for CBS Radio, where he worked with Edward R. Murrow, and became a producer for the NBC television newscast with Chet Huntley and David Brinkley.

After Mr. Hepner left television, he began a new career in publishing, first for J. Wiley and Sons in New York and then, after 1968, with Houghton Mifflin in Boston. After his official retire-

ment, he began reviewing classical music for the Globe.

Between 1983 and 1990 he covered more than 300 performances; he also wrote many book reviews for the paper. He was active for decades in the Harvard Musical Association, and wrote its history, which was published in 1987. A longtime member of the St. Botolph Club, he organized many events showcasing local composers and young musicians there.

As a critic, he brought an enthusiasm to his new job rarely encountered even in a young journalist — and Mr. Hepner was already nearly 70.

His curiosity about the repertoire was comprehensive and contagious, but his particular passion was for chamber music — this may have come from a close friendship with violinist Isaac Stern that stretched across six decades. He had a limitless capacity for enjoyment, which he passed on to his readers, and when something was not quite right at a concert, Hepner always conveyed this with a sense of puzzled regret.

His curiosity was insatiable, and he had the instincts of a born reporter. He had a wide circle of friends and informants, who enjoyed his company both at his home in Cambridge, where the

hospitality of Mr. Hepner and his wife, Betty, was legendary, and at the St. Botolph Club. When he invited you to join him there, you knew that lunch wouldn't be the only thing on the grill — he always wanted to know what was going on, and he always knew something you didn't, which he would impart with the suspense-spinning skills of a master storyteller; the punch line would arrive with the coffee, tea, and dessert. Even after physical problems made it hard for him to get out much, he had the telephone as an ally. He was always eager to learn more, and after his eyesight failed, he enjoyed listening to audio books — it gave him pleasure to listen to Anthony Tommasini's biography of Virgil Thomson. At the Globe he had been a particular friend and mentor to Tommasini, now The New York Times's chief music critic.

Mr. Hepner is survived by his wife of 50 years, Elizabeth Hepner; his son, Thomas Hepner of Framingham; his sister, Jean Eskind of Mountain View, Calif.; one nephew; and several nieces, grandnieces, and grandnephews. The private interment was at Mount Auburn Cemetery, and a memorial gathering will be held after Jan. 1.

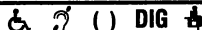
