WHEREAS:-

A communication has been received from His Honor the Mayor announcing the death of Edward J. Dunphy, a former President of the City Council and former Superintendent of Streets, and recommending that suitable action be taken with reference thereto.

Mr. Dunphy was born in South Boston and had resided in Cambridge for thirty-five years, being prominently identified with its business and political life for many years.

He was a member of the Board of Aldermen in 1915 and a member of the City Council, and President of that body for the years 1916 and 1917. In September 1918 he was appointed and confirmed Superintendent of Streets which office he held to April 1928.

During his tenure of office both as a legislative officer and an administrative officer he showed himself a kindly man with a deep interest in his adopted city and its traditions. He was a highly respected citizen and his pleasing personality drew to him a legion of friends who all mourn his passing away. It is therefore

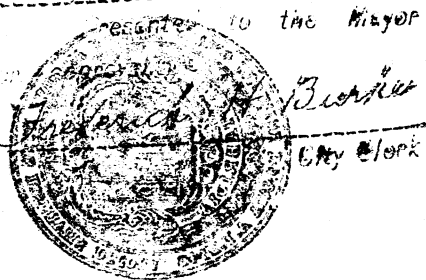
