Dear Bob:

I wish to take this opportunity to submit my name for membership on the Human Rights Commission. I do so because I believe that the projected work and activities of the Commission are of great importance and that my participation in them would only be a continuation of professional and personal interests of many years.

As you know, I worked for some five years here in Cambridge (1972-1977) in advocacy programs for the elderly, first as Director of the Committee of Elders and then as Director of the Council on Aging. It was during that period that I started newsletters for both organizations, participated in many program 'firsts' and became thoroughly familiar not only with the needs of this target population but also with the local, state and federal programs intended to respond to those needs. I initiated, through these two organizations, such programs as Elderhire, ElderRide, the Buylines program, and participated in such housing initiatives as the Manning Apartments and Norfolk House, to name a few.

Since leaving the employ of the city in 1977 I have been employed by the Unitarian Universalist Association of Churches of North America as Executive Secretary to its Committee on Aging, as Director of its Office of Lesbian and Gay Concerns, and as Associate Director of Social Responsibility. At the present time I retain the assignment of Director of the Office of Lesbian and Gay Concerns as a half-time employee. On September 17, 1984 I, myself, reached that threshold age of sixty-five.

My work at the UUA and as an active member of the Arlington Street Church in Boston and long-time activist within denominational circles, I have for many years been involved with issues of racism and racial equality, including working with an organization such as Community Change, Inc. in the conducting of a racial attitudes audit in-house, advocating self-empowerment via a Black Affairs Council, etc. Work in this area has been a denominational priority and continues to be, in ways that have engaged my attention and energies because of my position and because of personal concerns.

It was my privilege and with considerable personal gratification that I offered testimony at the hearing on the Human Rights Commission bill before it reached its final form, especially as it pertained to inclusion of the rights of lesbians and gay men. Perhaps only because I have experienced what it is like to be a member of this group have I felt working and advocating for their particular needs more personally satisfying. However, I have long ago become convinced of the universality of needs among many so-called minorities and am very pleased that the Cambridge ordinance is as inclusive as it has become.

The City of Boston approximately two years ago conducted a major research project on the needs of lesbians and gay men in Boston. I was a member of the panel which heard and reported on the needs of youth, the elderly and the handicapped. My participation on that panel was solicited because of my interest in the target groups named. I currently serve as the chair of something called project Aware, a committee of the Massachusetts Committee of Children and Youth, which has been exploring ways of assisting professional workers with youth to respond to the needs of lesbian and gay youth as well as the homophobia that centers markedly with teenagers toward those they suspect of being gay.

I have worked with and cared for a variety of special-needs adults, from college days, including the blind, crippled victims of disease and accidents, retardates and the emotionally disturbed. I believe I carry a sensitivity to a wide variety of needs which this broadly-defined category includes.

I have been a resident of Cambridge for thirty-five years, first as a graduate theological student then as a permanent resident. I lived over fifteen years in the Central Square neighborhood, then in East Cambridge, now in North Cambridge. By residency and by my years of work here, I know and love this city, with its ethnic and racial richness and its neighborhood and community identities and energies. I would like to become more involved again in its life, now that my professional work is becoming slightly less frenetic.

Please let me know if there is anything more I might do to respond to what is desired to qualify for membership on the Human Rights Commission.
