Dear Councillors:

I have reviewed the proposed amendment to the General Ordinances and have examined the relevant law. The Cambridge City Council clearly has the authority to establish such a Commission. I have, however, some comments on certain sections of the ordinance.

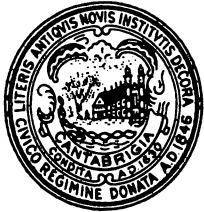
Powers and Duties, sections (b) and (c). It is quite clear, as a matter of law, that the Cambridge City Council has no authority to supercede the powers granted to the Cambridge School Committee by c. 71 of the General Laws. Any actions by the Commission involving the Cambridge public schools would require the approval of the School Committee.

Powers and Duties, section (i). The Commission may "advance the enactment of legislation" before the Great and General Court and Congress. They have no authority, however, to expend any funds for the purpose of taking action to influence the result of a referendum proposed to be submitted to the people at a State election. Anderson v. City of Boston, 376 Mass. 178, 380 NE2d 628, appeal dismissed, 439 U.S. 1060.

AN ORDINANCE

In amendment to an ordinance formerly entitled "The General Ordinances of the City of Cambridge" as revised in 1972 and now designated as "The Code of the City of Cambridge".

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cambridge as follows:

Chapter Two entitled "Administration" is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof a new Article XXXIX entitled "Cambridge Commission on Nuclear Disarmament and Peace Education", which reads as follows:

ARTICLE XXXIX. CAMBRIDGE COMMISSION ON NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT AND PEACE EDUCATION

Establishment.

There shall be a Cambridge Commission on Nuclear Disarmament and Peace Education.

Function and Purpose.

It shall be the function of the Commission to:

- (a) Support the actions taken by the Cambridge City Council to protect the citizens of Cambridge and lessen the danger of nuclear destruction to the City of Cambridge;
- (b) Work to implement the November 4, 1981 mandate of Cambridge voters to "contact the Massachusetts Congressional Delegation to place a freeze on the further development of nuclear weapons in the City of Cambridge;"

Powers and Duties.

The powers and duties of the Commission shall include the following:

- (c) To support and assist teachers initiating such nuclear disarmament curriculum.
- (d) To hold, and assist in the conduct of, educational and advocacy meetings or hearings on nuclear disarmament by public agencies, organizations, institutions or private persons in the City of Cambridge. This shall include an effort to reach out to those most affected by the diversion of funds from the City of Cambridge: organized labor, the poor, the unemployed, minorities and women.
- (e) To initiate public exhibits and events in City Hall, city libraries, public schools and in other locations within the City, consistent with the stated purposes of this ordinance.
- (f) To cooperate with public agencies and private groups in other cities and towns of the Commonwealth in programs for disarmament education.
- (g) To promote mutual understanding with people in other nations consistent with the purposes of this ordinance, such as the City Council's proposal for a "twin" city in the USSR, and the receptions held by the City of Cambridge for peace visitors from Europe and Japan.

(h) To develop and recommend policy regarding the prevention of nuclear destruction to the City of Cambridge and the safety of Cambridge citizens to all departments, divisions, and agencies of the City, including the City Manager and the City Council.

(i) To advance the enactment of legislation which promotes nuclear disarmament at city, state, and federal levels, and to monitor the implementation of such legislation.

(j) To assist the Civil Defense Department of Cambridge in its duties, consistent with the purposes of this ordinance.

(k) To determine the extent of nuclear weapons-related industry within the City, and to study advocate and assist in the conversion of such industries to non-nuclear weapon-related activities, including the retraining of workers employed in those nuclear-related industries.

(l) To make public statements and act on matters related to nuclear disarmament.

(m) To raise funds for the use of the Commission and to accept money, gifts, and services for its exclusive use and expend or use the same, and subject to appropriation or to receipt of such money, gifts, and services, employ clerical and technical assistants or consultants; and to be consulted by and make recommendations to the City Manager with regard to the employment of the Executive Director.

Membership, Appointment, Term, Removal

(a) The Commission shall consist of twenty members, all of whom shall be appointed initially by the City Manager to serve for the following terms:

(1) six members shall serve for a one year term;

(2) seven members shall serve for a two year term;

(3) seven members shall serve for a three year term.

After the initial terms all Commissioners shall be appointed for a term of three years.

(b) If any Commissioner misses three unexcused meetings of the Commission during a calendar year, that position of said Commissioner shall be automatically vacated upon certification to the City Manager by the Commission.

(c) After the initial appointments, subsequent members of the Commission shall be appointed by the City Manager from recommendations provided by the Commission. The Commission shall consult with recognized groups working for nuclear disarmament to obtain names of qualified candidates. Vacancies on the Commission shall be filled not later than thirty days after the vacancy occurs; and if a vacancy occurs prior to the expiration of the member's term, an appointment shall be made for the remainder of the term.

(d) The Commission shall be representative of the socio-economic and racial/ethnic populations of the City.

Election of Chairperson; By-laws.

The members of the Commission shall elect a Chairperson from among its members, and shall adopt by-laws for the Commission.

Qualifications of Commissioners

(a) All prospective Commissioners shall believe in and support the goal of nuclear disarmament as embodied in the resolutions passed by the Cambridge City Council.

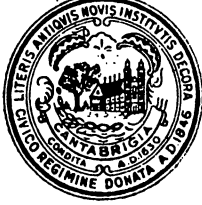

(l) To make public statements and act on matters related to nuclear disarmament.

(m) To raise funds for the use of the Commission and to accept money, gifts, and services for its exclusive use and expend or use the same, and subject to appropriation or to receipt of such money, gifts, and services, employ clerical and technical assistants or consultants; and to be consulted by and make recommendations to the City Manager with regard to the employment of the Executive Director.

Membership, Appointment, Term, Removal

(a) The Commission shall consist of twenty members, all of whom shall be appointed initially by the City Manager to serve for the following terms:

(1) six members shall serve for a one year term;

(2) seven members shall serve for a two year term;

(3) seven members shall serve for a three year term.

After the initial terms all Commissioners shall be appointed for a term of three years.

(b) If any Commissioner misses three unexcused meetings of the Commission during a calendar year, that position of said Commissioner shall be automatically vacated upon certification to the City Manager by the Commission.

(c) After the initial appointments, subsequent members of the Commission shall be appointed by the City Manager from recommendations provided by the Commission. The Commission shall consult with recognized groups working for nuclear disarmament to obtain names of qualified candidates. Vacancies on the Commission shall be filled not later than thirty days after the vacancy occurs; and if a vacancy occurs prior to the expiration of the member's term, an appointment shall be made for the remainder of the term.

(d) The Commission shall be representative of the socio-economic and racial/ethnic populations of the City.

Election of Chairperson; By-laws.

The members of the Commission shall elect a Chairperson from among its members, and shall adopt by-laws for the Commission.

Qualifications of Commissioners

(a) All prospective Commissioners shall believe in and support the goal of nuclear disarmament as embodied in the resolutions passed by the Cambridge City Council.

(b) Commissioners must be residents of the City of Cambridge at the time of appointment.
